HOW TO GROW ROSES

Few plants reward the grower with two or three "eyes" or joints above as much enjoyment and satisfaction the point where they are "budded." In man yeases the Nurserymen prune

Then fill in your soil as prescribed of each variety.

Then fill in your soil as prescribed mixing in some well-rotted cow manure, if possible. Roses are gross feeders and they can a sorb a considerable amount of plant food.

In selecting your roses commence with the Hybrid Tea varieties as this class is very floriferous, flowers are usually shapely, and many are delightfully fragrant. This class planted as early in Spring as weather conditions permit will bloom from June until frost the same season as planted. Rose bushes of this type are "budded" on wild soots, the "bud being characterized by what looks like a knot at the point where the branches emanate from the stem. In preparing the bed make sure of good drainage. Roses do not like wet feet. Do this by placing stones or course rubble at the bottom of the bed about eighteen inches or two feet below the surface. Then fill in your soil as prescribed of each variety.
