

Latest News Notes From China

With the sigric of the truce in North China, conditions in Tientsin, which had been greatly disturbed for several weeks, speedily returned to normal. The feeling of tension gave place to one of confidence. Gunmen were disarmed, special patrols dishanded, barricades removed from the streets, and barbed wire taken down. Thousands of refugees who had flocked into the city to escape the Japanese advance began to wend their way home. Many of these were heartened by reports that the authorities intended to remit the land tax for a period in the districts affected by the operain the districts affected by the opera-tions, as well as affording relief in other directions.

Shanhaikwan, where the Great Wall

Abolition of Harem Compl cates Love and Marriage -Freedom Confuses Women

Thicago.—Dressed in the ancient flowing robes of her peoole, a youthful, boyish bobbed apostle of new Turkey, is seeking help from her western sisters about the problems of old maids and dependent women which she credited to occidental civilization when it drove the harem from the near east and gave freedom to Oriental women. She is Selma Ekrem, daughter of Ali Ekrem Bey, former Governor of Jerusalem and is a delegate to the International Congress of Women. In an address she traced the change in life for Turkish women. "It was only ife for Turkish women. "It was only 11 years ago, when Turkey became a Republic, that Turkish women found an ally in the Government instead of an enemy. Barriers came down with the rapidity of lightning."

Then in her precise English, she tly said that while all this had brought increased freedom for women it had also brought griefs. LOVE COMPLICATED.




