

Ontario Hospital At Orillia Burned

Patients Safe As Auditorium Is Destroyed—Patient Overcome by Smoke—Wiring Is Blamed

Orillia, Aug. 29.—Fire believed to have been caused by defective wiring in the main auditorium of the Ontario Hospital building, caused damage estimated at \$15,000, and destroyed the building on the ground floor of the blaze was brought under control.

Investigation conducted by Superintendent Dr. S. J. W. Horne revealed that the fire broke out on the stage, at one end of the auditorium, and that it had worked its way up the stairs to the rafters, then setting the roof ablaze.

All patients were removed without difficulty, Dr. Horne said.

Fire Chief Joseph Blackey of Orillia, who hastened to the scene with many men as could be seen, said improperly covered electric wires were the probable cause.

Lad Walks Around With Neck Broken

St. Thomas Youth, Injured in Bathing, His Condition Revealed While Wrestling

St. Thomas, Aug. 29.—Eugene Steinbock, 112 Forest Avenue, St. Thomas, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Steinbock, walked around for nearly three weeks with a broken neck, an X-ray has revealed the fracture, and Steinbock has been placed in a plaster cast where he will likely remain for the best part of a year.

Physicians at the fracture set becoming marveled at the fact that the lad survived at all times following the accident.

Young Steinbock was camping at the home of his parents, near the shore of Lake Erie, with other young men of the St. Thomas Collegiate Institute. While swimming in the lake, Steinbock's shoulders were struck by the weight of a diving board, and he fell into the water. His head struck the bottom of the diving board, and he was thrown into the air.

None of the patients who were taken to the hospital were injured by the fire. There were 200 in the building at the time of the fire. The fire started in the auditorium, and it spread to the roof.

United States Would Dump Wheat On World Markets

European, Argentine Yield May Offset North American Crop Failures—Grain Parley Resumed

London, Aug. 29.—Fear of a world-wide "dumping" of wheat unless an international production agreement is reached, has been the subject of discussion at the Wheat Conference which opened in London today.

The parley was spurred to a desire for swift action, after months of delay and postponed parleys here and in Geneva, by a 72-hour ultimatum from the United States to "agree or else" will dispose of our surplus by subsidizing exports.

The conference meets in Canada House to draw up the terms of a wheat acreage limitation treaty for the next two years as one way of raising prices and securing the farmer a fair return on grain. Twenty nations are represented, including the United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina.

The delegates held private informal conversations with the experts present on many days on the agenda.

"The members of the United States delegation," said a spokesman, "are in private accord on an agreement 'about even.'"

It is expected that the United States will propose a 72-hour ultimatum to the other nations, and that the parley will be adjourned for a few days.

15,000 Mile Journey

Their stay at the work camp will be for three months and they will be allowed food, shelter and clothes and \$5 per month. Physically unfit single men will be allowed to remain on relief.

To commemorate the hundredth anniversary of the departure from Picton, N.S., of the first Canadian Steamship, the Canadian Government will issue a special stamp. The stamp will be issued on August 12, 1933.

Ten Lives Lost Off New Jersey

Reported Drowned in Gale Between Atlantic and Ocean Cities

Ocean City, N.J., Aug. 29.—Ten lives were reported to have been drowned today along the Atlantic coast between Atlantic City and Ocean City in a furious gale which capped several small boats.

One of the victims of the storm was Captain Theodore van Zandt, who was aboard the sailing boat, Etta. The boat turned over a quarter of a mile off shore, near the Atlantic City light. The captain and his crew were reported to have been drowned.

About 30 other boats, most of them fishing smacks, were standing off shore, while others headed for the coast. Many of the boats were blown away and several were reported to have been wrecked.
