PLACEMENT OF FERTILIZERS WITH RESPECT TO SEED

(Experimental Farm Notes)

During the last ten years, investigators of fertilizer practice have given a great deal of attention to the question of the proper placement of fertilizer. It has been found that the best results have been obtained by placing the fertilizer in the soil in such a way that it is in contact with the seed at the time of sowing. This can be accomplished by using a broadcast method, or by using a band method. The broadcast method is the simplest, but it is not the most efficient.
