Christmas. For a marvel so stupendous, God-fell back upon a child. There was nothing in the world like Christmas till Jesus came. On the day of his birth, God called the nations together and set a little child in their midst. From the beginning a full-grown man had stood in the centre, but the circle gathered around him had never been joyous. Sometimes the central man had been a general, and sometimes a King, occasionally he had been a scholar, and frequently a Saint; but no matter who he was, the circle was not enchanted and the heart refused to sing. But as soon as a child was placed at the centre, humanity began to organize itself in unprecedented ways and to move forward along original lines. It began to sing a new song. The world had for ages been despondent and hopeless, and no potentate or miracle-worker, however mighty, had been able to lift it out of its darkness. But when God took a child and set Him in the midst, then was the world's mouth filled with laughter and all things became new. This is the difference then, between the ancient world and the modern, the first had an adult at the centre, the latter has a child. Out of the child heart—where are coming the forces for the deformed in spirit, the lame in will, the infirm in purpose and the soiled in heart. The world of today is pagan of heart because it refuses to celebrate Christmas in the only right way. It is bewildered and rebellious because Jesus has no controlling place in its ideals and ambitions. Individuals remain unfriendly at heart, bitter in dispositions and worldly in soul because Christmas is treated as a social and not as a religious festival.

If people and nations could be persuaded to grasp the fact that Christmas is love—love to God and love to their fellow-men—there would be an end of war.

The remedy for war between nations and nations, class and class, creed and creed, is the way of Christ that is, the application of His way of life to all the tangled problems of our time. The cure for hatred between individual and individual is the spirit of Jesus, for love is the ingredient that makes sweet the salt and bitter poisons of the world's heart.

The secret of a half-pagan world is to be found, not in the powerlessness of Jesus, but in the inference of all who compel Him to bow down outside the door of their heart. Christ is outside the hearts and lives of millions and not within as comrades and hosts. Christmas fulfills a dual purpose of reminding us of our Lord's birthday in Bethlehem and of His desire to share the hospitality of our lives in redemptive service and enabling co-operation in His work.
