Sche people develop ashma because they react to certain foods, such as cereals, eggs, strawberries, fruits and nuts. Indeed, the list of foods which may be responsible is a very long one, because most foods contain some vegetable or animal protein. Other cases arise out of a hypersensitive condition to the bacteria or germs which may be lodged in nose, throat or teeth.

Attacks of asthma are particularly distressing and alarm those who have not previously witnessed a severe attack. There is no need for alarm in so far as the attack is concerned, because the attacks are not fatal. In the asthmatic who is emotional, it is desirable to avoid excitement and to maintain a quiet manner of life.
