Organization in Meeting at London Favored Pasteurization By-Law for Industry. Elected New Officers.

That a pasteurization by-law would benefit the whole dairy industry in the London district was the view expressed by W. H. Forster, president of the National Dairy Council, in a speech at the Western Ontario Dairy Men's convention in the Masonic Temple at London last Thursday afternoon.

Discussing the milk situation in London, he stated that the industry is in a deplorable condition and urged a by-law requiring pasteurization.

The speaker also said that the National Dairy Council will make representations to the federal government to have the tariff on certain is not manufactured in Canada, removed as an aid to the industry.
