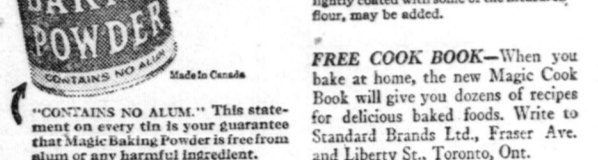

The Use of Fertilizers (Part 2). 1. Can fertilizers injure the soil? 2. Can I lose or gain money by using fertilizers under present conditions? 3. Can fertilizers injure the soil?

At the moment certain crops which for many years have given reasonable crops of wheat are being raised at discouragingly low prices. If the entire cost of the fertilizer is to be charged to the farmer at present prices there is not much argument in favour of doing much for the wheat crop.

Again, in the 1922 demonstration tests carried out on potatoes which tested 176 half acre blocks, whereas the 1923 tests, of which the results are not yet available, showed a gain of 12 1/2 per bushel. The fertilizer which gave the greatest gain throughout 43-33 cent cost per bushel. If the net cost be charged to the grower, it compares with the rest of the field.

One of the most promising fields for return on fertilizers is that applied to pastures. In one test carried on in a good dairymen's farm for the last two years, the average carrying capacity for the unfertilized area of eight acres was 225 pasture days. On the same land when fertilized at a cost of \$222 an acre, the carrying capacity was raised to 421 pasture days for four years.
