A transaction which is of wide-spread interest in this community, took place on the first of the year, when the Jarvis Division of the Hamilton Dairies, a subsidiary of the Borden Milk Co., was purchased by the Marshall Dairy Ltd., with Lea Marshall who has successfully managed the plant during its operations here as President and General Manager.

Mr. Marshall is well known to practically everyone in this district as well as being widely known in Dairy circles, and has had a wealth of experience in the Dairy Industry.

He commenced his career in this line in 1904, almost thirty years ago at the Regah Cheese Factory just west of Jarvis, and worked under the supervision of W. Cameron, who was cheesemaker there at that time, and who is now superintendent of the Creamery Dept. of the City Dairy in Toronto.

DEATH SUMMONS J. R. SEATON

Death suddenly removed one of our foremost citizens in the person of Mr. Reginald Seaton on Saturday morning, December 31st, 1932, at his place of business. While reading his papers, he was suddenly stricken with a severe heart attack, and despite all medical skill could do, he answered the call to the great beyond.

In his death, at the age of 54, Hagersville loses a prominent druggist and man identified with the town as Town Treasurer. He was ever interested in all fields of sports and was a lover of the bowling green. He was a member of the Masonic Order, and also an Oddfellow. Early in his life, he joined St. Andrews Presbyterian church, and, at the time of his death, became a member of the United Church.

Mr. Seaton was the only son of the late John and Emily Carter Seaton, and was a graduate of the School of Pharmacy, University of Toronto.
