The following hints on the subject were supplied by Dr. Humphreys, of the U.S. Weaber Bureau, for the information of Boy Scouts, but they are just as valuable to other people. Charles Fitchugh Talman's Science Service feature, Why the Weather? (Washington) quotes the following: "During a thunder-storm it is dangerous to be close beside a wire fence. In this position one may be kilked or, at least, hurt if the fence is struck anywhere along its entire course.

"It is also dangerous to take shelter during a thunder-storm under a tall tree, or, indeed, a tree of any kind if it is out in the open, and all the more so if it is at or near the top of a hill.

"It is advisable to keep away from the top of a hill during a thunder-storm, even if some distance from the lightning. Another perfectly safe place to be is inside a frame ly safe place to be is inside a frame structure of steel, or an all-metal building of any kind. 

Ottawa.—In a report on Canada's tobacco industry, Dr. N. T. Nelson of the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, points out that with the increasing exports of raw tobacco in recent years there has come a change in the type of tobacco use. In 1927 and 1928 the bulk of the tobacco exported was Burley, but in 1931 and 1932 this had been largely supplanted by bright flue-cured. This change is mainly attributed to the work of the Tobacco Division of the Dominion Experimental Farms, in conjunction with the Department of Trade and Commerce, in bringing to the attention of manufacturers in the United Kingdom the merit and high quality of Canadian bright flue-cured to bacco.
