On Saturday, April 22nd, at 2:30 p.m. there passed away at his home in Detroit, Mich. Joseph Brennan.

Deceased suffered from hardening of the arteries, having suffered an attack on Christmas day from which he recovered only to be stricken again about two weeks prior to his demise.

The remains were brought to Canada and the funeral was held from the home of his sister, Mrs. R. A. Nelles, Jarvis, Mass was held in Nelles, Jarvis, R.C. Church, Walpole, at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, April 25th. Rev. Fr. Harris, officiating.

Interment took place in the R. C. cemetery in the church yard. Deceased in compliance to an oft expressed request being laid to rest by the side of the son Albert Edward (Bert) Brennan who predeceased him about nine years ago.

Deceased was the son of John and Mary Brennan and was born on the old Brennan farm near Hagersville. Early in life he married Miss Helena Masti Procunier and to them six children were born, three of whom survive.

For a number of years Mr. Brennan owned and operated a threshing outfit, later he was fireman and then engineer of the M.C.R. returning to manage the farm for his mother, he lived there for a number of years, finally selling his interest and moving to Detroit, where he was employed by the Fisher Auto Bodies Mfg. Co.

He was well and widely known in this and the surrounding neighborhoods and respected and loved by a wide circle of friends who extend sincere sympathy to the bereaved family.

Besides the sorrowing widow there are left to mourn one son, Geo. Brennan, Detroit and two daughters, Mrs. M. Slack, Hagersville and Mrs. Geo. Cudney, Port Rowan.

WEED INSPECTORS TO MEET

According to notices which are being sent out this week the annual meeting of the Haldimand Weed Inspectors will be held in the Court House, Cayuga, on Wednesday May 17th.

In addition to the usual discussion regarding weeds and means of effectively controlling weeds, a summary will be given of the Seed Grain Survey which was conducted in this county during the past year. If time permits, there may be some pictures thrown on the screen for the benefit of those who were not present last year and as a review for the old inspectors.

Mr. A. R. G. Smith, Chief Weed Inspector for Western Ontario, and Mr. A. H. Martin of the Department of Agriculture, Toronto, will be the principal speakers. The meeting will commence promptly at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

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
