VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

Dear Mr. Editor:—
Should Jarvis have more adequate Fire Protection? In view of the disaster that occurred in this village approximately two weeks ago it would appear to the writer that it is an outstanding necessity. It could easily be said that the Hagersville Department with their pumper equipment is sufficient for this village but that could and might have saved in value far exceeding the cost of waterworks system that has ever been brought before the citizens for their consideration. It could be said by those disinterested in the advancement of the village, that it will be a long time before a re-occurrence of a similar disaster, therefore precaution that means a necessary addition to the already overtaxed taxpayers absolutely unnecessary. As it appears to me, the decrease in the value of established places of business here, the destruction of property in the village since the two oldest and best established places of business have been destroyed is appalling and demands immediate action of some sort to stimulate a business relationship between the consumers and the retail merchants in the Village. We can't just depend upon the citizens of Jarvis alone to offer the retail merchants sufficient business to enable them to stay in the village. We must have a plan to attract the people here who they keep on hand the up-to-date and varied stock that the public is today demanding and what have we in Jarvis to attract the people here from the nearby community?

Tom Wilson is dead. STORING SOYBEANS

By this time, no doubt, all soybeans have been threshed and some attention should be paid to the storing of this year's crop. The soybean is a crop that is very hard on the machinery and it is a good idea to store it in a way that will keep it in good condition. It is with a reasonably low content of moisture, storage will not be difficult. On the other hand, a high moisture content adds to the danger of spoilage when stored. It has been recommended that storage in bins, which may be made of concrete, is the best way to store soybeans. The bins should be well ventilated and the moisture content should be kept below 15 per cent. It is also a good idea to store the beans in a way that will keep them from being damaged by rodents or birds.
