Purchases Purebred Holstein Cattle

(Werner Bros.)

"Gold Diggers of 1933"

Mr. A. C. Phipps who is establishing a herd of purebred Holstein cattle on his farm at Caledonia has already bought seventeen head of females mostly from breeders in the Counties of Oxford and Waterloo. These have been carefully selected with a view to building up a herd that will type, breeding and production will compare favorably with the best, while the standard of health to be maintained assures the people of Caledonia of being able to obtain milk free from all controllable diseases and impurities.

In making his selection Mr. Phipps sought breeding that has been responsible for the development of some of the most popular family strains of the black and white cow in Canada, his purchases including several with creditable records or the progeny of R.O.P. dams. A pair of three-year-old heifers he bought, both made good records as two-year-olds. One of these finished her first lactation period with 10,775 lbs. milk showing an average test of 3.87% fat, while the other closed her year with 9,915 lbs. and an average test of 3.87% fat. Another good mature cow he purchased, made a record in the 305 day division, 11,645 lbs. milk with an average test of 3.42% fat.

This new herd that Mr. Phipps has started will make up mostly with cows and heifers ranging in age from two to four years, and they come from some of the outstanding herds in the County referred to.
