Hamilton, Sept. 22.—Rev. D. B. Marsh, well-known astronomer, and Presbyterian minister, died early today at his home, 118 Barclay Street, Westdale, aged 74. He had been ill for the past six months.

While following the active life of a minister, Dr. Marsh was found time to prosecute studies in his favorite science of astronomy, and made contributions to its discoveries which have been of value to the world.

In this connection he recently was awarded \$1,000 by the Canadian Government.

Born near Meaford, Ontario, he was educated at the University of Toronto, where he received his B.S., F.R.S.A., and Ph.D. degrees. He was a member of the Royal Society, the Royal Astronomical Society, and the Royal Canadian Institute.

He was a member of the Hamilton Astronomical Club, and was its president for several years. He was also a member of the Hamilton Club, the Hamilton Golf and Country Club, and the Hamilton Yacht Club.

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Fire Prevention

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—Faced with an annual fire toll of 300 lives and \$45,000,000 in property damage, Canada will set aside the week of Oct. 8-14 as a special fire-prevention week.

A proclamation to this effect was made today in the Canadian Gazette. The proclamation says that it is recommended that all buildings be inspected for fire hazards during the week, which shall be from Oct. 8 to Oct. 14, 1933.

Southampton Shut Out of First of Semi-Finals

Lampman Beats Goldsmith in Pitcher's Duel

Ken Lampman and his teammates proved on Saturday that all the players are not in the Bruce League when they shut out the 1932 Champions in the first of the semi-finals in the best all-round exhibition of baseball seen here this season, the locals took the Fishermen into camp by a 2-0 score.

Lampman not only took the winners end of a thrilling pitcher's duel against the much-talked-of Lefty Goldsmith but drove out a clean three-lagger in the ninth and scored Davidson's well placed sacrifice. Nelly in serious trouble, he pitched a fine game of ball, allowing only five scattered safes, striking out eight and giving no walks.

Goldsmith for the visitors also turned in a good game, but was nicked for a single and two three baggers both of which resulted in runs. He walked four and was credited with nine strikeouts.

Both teams showed fine fielding in the game while the home team's error column and the locals being charged with two.

Gordon Smith's spectacular running catch of Goldsmith's long fly to centre and a smart pickup of Lampman's grounder by Schilling were the outstanding solo plays of the game while the only double play honors went to the Hagersville's T. Hodgson-E. Lampman-Davidson combination.

Davidson took the batting honors for the locals. He walked out clean three bagger in the sixth to score on the throw-in of Army Hodgson's long fly to centre and sacrifice to bring in Lampman in the eighth.

The second game of the series at Southampton on Wednesday when Archie Dougherty will probably do the mound work for the locals' promise to give the Bruce County fans their money's worth.

Hagersville will probably have the support of at least a bus load of rooters to hope to make it two straight games.
