CAPT. J. W. JOHNSTON MASTER MARINER

We are pleased to reprint the following brief history of the marine life of Capt. Johnston, a one-time well known resident of our Village. The editor also boasts of having in his possession an original colored picture of his fleet sailing craft, the "UNDINE," which was executed in 1876 at which time Capt. Johnston was the owner and Captain and it was during rescue of a crew from a boat which foundered in Lake Erie during a terrific storm. The following is from the pen of the writer of "Olds and Ends" column in the Hamilton Spectator.

"One of the best known skippers of the Great Lakes sixty odd years ago was James W. Johnston, who was visited at his home in Burlington yesterday and despite his 83 years of age recalled, without apparent effort, many interesting happenings in the dim pages of the past. A hero of the lakes over half a century ago, Capt. Johnston still has in his possession a solid gold watch which was presented to him for his courageous act in swinging about in a storm 20 miles off Cleveland and rescuing the entire crew from a boat which sank in a violent storm on Lake Erie. At that time Capt. Johnston was the owner of a then famous sailing freighter, the Undine. The inscription in the book which was read: 'To Capt. J. W. Johnston, for rescuing a crew on Lake Erie, 1876.' That was just 58 years ago and 'Capt. Johnston could not recall the name of the lost ship.

The famous old skipper at 19 years of age was given his first taste of fresh water sailing when he was apprenticed to the captain of a sailing vessel. Later he worked on the Billie Townsend, the Agnes, the Echo and other boats and finally was made captain of the Hagar, a schooner of the Florence, which he owned himself. These boats years ago were all famous sailing craft that plied the Great Lakes. Johnston owned the points Lake Superior and Lake Michigan. Grain, lumber, ore and coal were the chief cargoes handled. All the boats were huge vessels carrying approximately two thousand yds of sail when all were unfurled. The mainsail on the Undine, Capt. Johnston stated, contained about 500 yards of canvas. This vessel was the pride of Capt. Johnston's fleet and considered to be about the fastest freighter of its type afloat on the Great Lakes. Another famous vessel was the Elma, which was captained by the late Tom Armstrong, who was also known in the port of Hamilton 50 years ago. These two boats were spontaneously raced from port to port and great was the rivalry between them. The "main race course" was between Hamilton and Oswego and when these two craft "hooped up" the boys on shore laid down their wagers of cigars, money, hats or what have you, as they might today on a horse race. The Undine was considered the faster of the two boats and in its day trimmed the best that came along. With favorable weather and a full cargo this boat could make Toronto from Hamilton in two and a half hours, which is not being going. When the first steam side wheelers were brought out the sailing vessels of the Undine type were used as a general lawrence and judges. His victory, however, was gained in that the hatched cut throat bill of lading was abolished at once by the government, much to the regret of the lake captains and owners of freighters.

In the old days under marine law a captain could throw away half his cargo to save his ship and not be responsible for the loss. On one occasion Capt. Johnston was on the other foot and when he unladed at Port Nelson he discovered he had 500 barrels of barley on board, which he demanded full payment for same from the owners.
