Latest Findings Of Science

The Amazing Termites—Their Highly Efficient Society Described In Scientists' Book

"Termites and Termite Control," a report of a committee organized by the University of California and the wood-using industries and has just been published by the University of California Press. Although primarily intended for biologists, architects, engineers, building inspectors and users of wood, there are chapters here on the deceptions of one kind of termite (\$87,141,000 is their estimated annual cost) this is about the only volume of its kind in print. Termites are not ants. They are more like cockroaches. In fact, ants are their deadly enemies.

HABITAT OF TERMITES

We usually associate termites with the tropics. They are common enough in the United States, ranging from the Gulf of Mexico to Michigan, and even further north. It is some of New York's buildings were eaten away by them recently—it is because of the advanced civilization and the greater use of wood.

PROTECTION FOR WOOD

What makes the termites so destructive is their liking for cellulose—wood. Especially wood invaded by fungi. The microscope reveals the termites in the digestive apparatus of termites breaking up wood in a form that can be digested. Without the protozoa termites would starve to death.

CONTROL OF POPULATION

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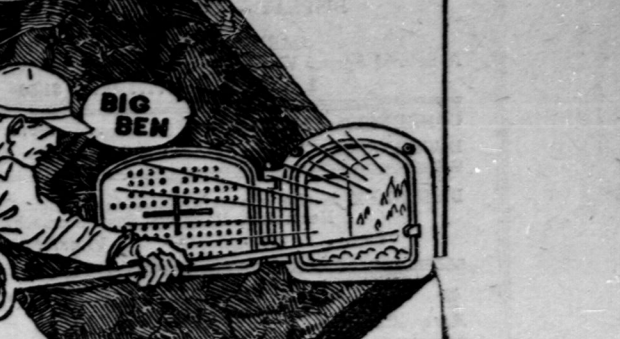
