Starling Menace

Under the caption some "Starling" information about the Starling" circulars are being mailed this week to all rural box holders in the county dealing with the starling menace as it affects the citizens of this county. This circular has been prepared by Prof. H. H. I. Drew, of the College at Guelph and A. Gordon Skinner, Agricultural Representative, Cayuga, and is pointed out, the object of it is to draw particular attention to the seriousness of the pest in Ontario, and to show the necessity for immediate action by all property owners to get forward every effort to bring the pest under control. The story of how this bird is increasing is very briefly put by saying that during the past fifteen years one pair of starlings has increased to over 1,000,000 pairs.
The circular continues to give the habits of the bird and methods of exterminating them.
This circular is being forwarded to all property owners in the district to be reprinted and through the co-operation of the Agricultural committee and the Haldimand County Council, is being mailed to all rural box holders in Ontario and covers an area of 350 acres.
