The annual paintings within this Hall are the work of Frank Brangwyn, R.A., Lord Iveagh who commissioned him to execute them died in 1927, and his Trustees presented the Paintings to the Corporation of Swansea in 1934.

Ottawa—Ordinary revenue of the Dominion Government for the first eight months of the present fiscal year ending Nov. 30 was more than \$28,000,000 ahead of the same period last year, and for the month of November, 1933, by nearly \$1,500,000 according to a statement just isued by the Comptroller of the Treasury.

For the first eight months of the year the Dominion treasury has a surplus of \$1,604,449 on ordinary account, expenditures totalling \$243,458,001 and receipts \$245,062,540.


