## TOWNSHIP MUNICIPAL COUNCIL MEET

Jarvis, Dec. 15, 1934  
The Municipal Council of the Township of Walpole met at the Town Hall, Jarvis, on Tuesday, December 15, 1934, for the purpose of adjournment. All members present.  
Reeve Frank Laidlaw presiding.  
Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.  
Dennis and Hunter — Resolved that the minutes be adopted as read.  
Pond and Dennis — Resolved that the minutes be adopted as read.  
Messrs J. W. Kelly and E. M. C. be appointed school attendance officers for the Township of Walpole for 1935 and that the same be taken to this resolution by a vote of 4 to 2.  
Pond and Hunter — Resolved that the minutes be adopted as read.  
In the fields of government and finance, Sir Charles stressed the necessity of dealing with the whole subject of unemployment which he characterized as the "greatest problem since the war"; recommended that all forms of transportation be regulated by a Dominion board, in order to effect railway co-ordination and cut down the losses of the Canadian National Railways, "the greatest deterrent to Canada's financial recovery"; and suggested that in the present strong market for government bonds, governments should extend long-term rather than short-term loans.  
In the first place few of our tax-paying laws are just and any change toward a better system must be the property classes that "bring eight hundred million dollars a year into the Treasury." In this case the government is in taxing buildings and property. If any change is made it will be a disaster to the property classes.

Mr. Bog laid emphasis on his  
ment that lending money for com-  
mercial purposes is the backbone of  
the bank's earning power and the  
bank is ready, and always has been  
ready, to consider applications for  
loans that fall within the category of  
prudent banking risks.

"Canadian business is vitally de-  
pendent upon external trade," Mr.  
Bog said, "and is, therefore, particu-  
larly interested in sterling and the  
United States dollar being stabilized.  
It does not appear probable that  
satisfactory stabilization of the  
world's money can be achieved up-  
on any other basis than a gold stand-  
ard."

In conclusion, Mr. Bog said:—"In  
Canada the depression did not reach  
the low level experienced in many  
other countries. The intrinsic  
wealth of the country was undoubt-  
edly a protective factor; the stabil-  
ity of the people another. A third  
factor was to be found in the banking  
system. In this connection as evi-  
dence of the confidence in the Bank  
of Canada the number of share-  
holders of the Bank residing out-  
side of Canada has increased during  
the last three years; over three hundred;  
and the fact that the Bank is doing  
nothing is done towards providing  
employment in a constructive way  
is a credit to the extent of confidence  
in the bank's management."  
The meeting adjourned.

Perfumed Petrol

Fastidious British motorists can  
now fill the tanks of their cars with  
scented petrol. A process has been  
developed whereby it is possible to  
perfume petrol, and it may soon be  
a delight to trail a motorist as the  
exhaust pipe of his car emits violet,  
lilac, or possibly attar of roses.

A patent has recently been granted  
for a process which eliminates the  
unpleasant smells from the exhaust  
gases of internal-combustion engines.

These gases can be given an agree-  
able odor by adding to each gallon  
of petrol four grammes of an artifi-  
cial musk compound, which it is
