HEALTH

IN RETREAT

At the opening of this century, the greatest and most outstanding disease enemy of mankind was tuberculosis. It is for us to determine how rapidly the retreat is to be pressed and the enemy annihilated.

Those who bewail the evils of the present day would be well advised to give some attention to its achievement. The yesterday were, in no ways, more attractive and picturesque, but they were nothing nearly so comfortable or so safe as the today in which we live.

Fortunate indeed have been those who were overcome by means of the discovery of some specific means for their prevention or through the development of a method to prevent their spread. Diphtheria is vanquished by diphtheria immunization and typhoid fever disappears when water and milk supplies are made safe.

It is remarkable that none the less tuberculosis is in retreat because the people have learned about this particular disease enemy, and they are fighting it with intelligence based upon their understanding.

There is so much less tuberculosis now than some previous one. Turns this idea around and you will see that just as soon as those who now have the disease stop passing it on to others, then tuberculosis will come to an end.

There is no such less tuberculosis today chiefly because patients have learned: in sanatoria, the public have read it in newspapers and have heard it in lectures, that tuberculosis is spread from one person to another in the germs laden spittle of the tuberculosis. Just so far as we have been in stopping the transfer of spittle to that extent have we pressed upon the retreating enemy.

It is much more easy to fight an enemy you know than one you do not know. Those who know that they have tuberculosis are not our enemies, because knowing that they have the disease, they can take precautions to protect the people with whom they come in contact. The whom they come in contact with, they know they are the tuberculosis patient who, because he does not know that he has the disease, is spreading the germs of tuberculosis in his spittle. These unsuspected cases must be revealed, through organized efforts at case-finding. If we are to defeat the enemy that is Tuberculosis.

Reasons Against Mr. Wright For Bank Board

The following is a reprint of an editorial which appeared in the December 29 issue of the Mail & Empire, Toronto.

We have it on good authority from the west that the Canadian Chamber of Commerce fell into error when it put forward Mr. R. A. Wright, of Drinkwater, Saskatchewan, as a director of the Bank of Canada. It is stated that he carried on a sustained battle against the cooperative marketing of Canada's surplus wheat and that he is identified with the farming community. Through the farming community, which is in his own province in the last election, his nomination for the bank has been condoned by a Saskatchewan Liberal convention because of his active hostility to the Bennett Government's Marketing Act which has the support of both parties beyond the Great Lakes. Be- cause of a single article in the Toronto Sun casually approving the slate of the seven men put forward by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, we feel that we owe it to our readers to furnish them with this later information regarding Mr. Wright. If it be true that he should not be elected to the board of the Bank of Canada.
