New Canada Movement Storms Haldimand And Brant

Twelve Speakers Enter Counties Next Week. Thirty-one Meetings Arranged. During the week of February 5th a series of thirty-one farm meetings are being held in the rural communities of Haldimand and Brant Counties. There will be the Twelfth and Thirteenth counties to be "stormed" by a group of young farm leaders who already have addressed scores of meetings in the counties of Bruce, Grey, Huron, Simcoe, Lambton, Kent, Essex and Middlesex. They are the vanguard of the New Canada Movement which is banding together groups of young farmers, in Ontario and eventually in all Canada, who will pledge themselves to discover and support ways of building a new and better Canada. Because of its sane method of forming opinions only by after examination of the facts, the Movement is necessarily non-partisan. The slogan of the N.C.M. is "Save Agriculture — Save Canada." It is essentially a movement of action, but only action after training. Rather than a new organization, it works within existing organizations. It has no officers, no offices, no machinery. Its methods have won the endorsement of scores of leaders in Church, University and farm circles. The Movement has pledged itself to awaken rural young people to the fact that Canadian Agriculture must be saved, that we are living in an utterly different world to that of our grandfathers; that Canadian youth must awaken, must rise and take for leadership as have the youth of other countries. Pledged recruits are being added to the N.C.M. at the rate of Five Hundred per week. Each local meeting is in charge of a committee of three interested citizens who are arranging a programme of music and songs to supplement the speaking. Team members of the original Big Team include: Alex Sims, ex-president of the Older Boys' Parliament; Jim Gibson, B.A. ex-president of the same body; Donald McLean, president United Farm Young People of Ontario; Gordon Lapp, ex-secretary of Ontario Boys' Work Board; Carroll Linday, B.S.A. ex-president U.F.P.O. With one exception all twelve members of the Team are young farmers who have volunteered their services. They receive no financial remuneration whatsoever. Those newly interested in the future of agriculture and permanent recovery in Canada is urged to attend one or more of these meetings; The Movement plans to cover every county in Ontario by April 1st and has been greatly encouraged by the exceptional interest shown in the counties already attended. THURSDAY — Cambressill, United Church; Neles Corners, Institute Hall; Snowbanks (to be announced); Mt. Pleasant, Conception School; Fisherville, Town Hall; West Dumfries, S.S. No. 11; St. George, Library Hall. FRIDAY — Dunn district, Marshall School; Rainham Centre, Town Hall; Onondaga, Town Hall; Nanticoke, Town Hall; Springville, Community Hall; Glen Morris, Women's Institute.
