Liver and Spinach Leaf
An excellent recipe to use for the whole family. Beef liver may be used to advantage in this fashion.

Spread out your own lemons, a sugar, a cup of cream, 1 tablespoon butter, 4 tablespoons cream, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 2 cups cooked spinach, 2 hard cooked eggs.

Wipe liver with damp cloth and simmer in boiling water until tender. Put through food chopper, using fine grater, and add cream, butter, salt and pepper. Mix thoroughly. Put a layer of eggs cut in slices into buttered mold. Add liver mixture and cover with a layer of spinach. Press firmly and cover mold with buttered paper. Put into a moderate oven for forty minutes or until firm. Turn out onto a hot platter and serve with cream and mushrooms.
