"FARM MUTUAL INSURANCE IN ONTARIO"

the anniversary date of the policy at least thirty cents per hundred of insurance (approximately the average cost for all companies over the preceding five years); to reimburse their big risks; and to do the other things set out in section 103 et seq of The Insurance Act. And so the situation is today.
I suggest you explain to your clients how they can organize their club as a mutual company under the Companies Act and why you are persuaded that it would not be permitted to be organized otherwise. At the same time I would be glad if you would tell me in your opinion as Superintendent has four good companies already well established and that there does not appear any necessity for a new company in Ontario.
And what of the cost? Is the farmer paying too much for his insurance? Last year the companies collected \$1,713,140.89 from the farmer and expended \$1,817,463.83, of which less than \$32,000 represented cost of management. In other words, with \$81,072.87 of interest in come from investments, they almost broke even. The farmer paid almost exactly what his insurance protection cost. Of course individual companies had varied experiences. Some incurred losses lower than they anticipated, and hence collected more than they paid out; others were unfortunate and paid out a great deal more than they collected but in all cases the farmer paid just what his protection cost, apart from the item of reserve.
"Are there any other reserves?" The companies in the aggregate increased their accumulated reserves by \$68,909 in 1933. On the other hand, they had to draw on the reserve to the extent of \$16,909 in 1932 and to the extent of \$410,000 in 1931.
"1931 was the most disastrous period in the history of farm mutual insurance in Ontario. Every company is required to send an audited financial statement to every member a week in advance of its annual meeting. These statements show the true and correct financial condition of each company. They show the assets and the liabilities of each company in strict accordance with the Insurance Act. Some companies have a surplus for a rainy day. All companies should have a surplus. Unfortunately all have not. The aggregate assets of the sixty-eight companies as at December 31, 1933, totalled \$2,069,346.27; their liabilities totalled \$1,353,519.07 so that their aggregate surplus was \$715,827.20 at that date. The substantial additional security provided by the premium note residue which may be assessed when necessary for losses and reserves is not included in these figures.
"And how is this surplus used? Under the Act, a company which has a surplus in excess of 25c for every \$100. of the total amount at risk may, with the approval of the Superintendent, charge rates lower than the minimum fixed by statute. Some thirteen companies in the province have such a surplus and are charging less than minimum rates. Thus in all cases the farmer pays the cost of nothing but the cost. If his company is well managed and fortunate he pays less than the minimum rate and no assessment; if his company is less well managed or unfortunate he probably pays more than the minimum rate and sometimes an assessment in addition. But in all cases he pays the cost as determined by the experience of his fellow members, which is probably well or poorly managed depending upon how great a personal interest he and his fellow members take in the annual meeting and in the management of their company's affairs.
"The farmers of Ontario have every reason to support their own insurance companies. They have made them; they want them. The companies have stood the test in some cases of more than three-quarters of a century and in all cases of more than two decades. No company in southern Ontario has ever been wound up.
"The main topic of the day was a report of the branch meeting held in Waterloo. This was splendidly given by Mr. J. R. Poid, of Chesapeake. Mrs. (Mrs.) Jewitt, also gave a short talk on the condition of a vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Poid and Mrs. Jewitt. Other programs of the meeting consisted of a word by Mr. J. R. DRIVER OF CAR IS INJURED WHEN CAR CRASHES INTO POLE
Caledonia March 18 — When the car in which they were riding were off No. 6 Highway into a ditch and crashed into a telephone pole four miles north of Caledonia yesterday Roy Jepson Hagersville suffered slight concussion and possible fractures of the ribs. He was moved to St. Joseph's Hospital, Hamilton. His companion, Edgar Walbrook, R.R. 5, Hagersville, sustained shock, but apparently was not injured. The top of the car was a mass of twisted steel and wreckage when it was towed into a garage here.

GYPED BY GYPSIES
One line in Ethelbert Nevins' famous song, "The Rosary," will have a deeper meaning than ever before for a teller in the Royal Bank at Fisherville. "O Memories that bless and fade" is fittingly with a new and personal meaning for W. F. Marshall, the teller in question, since a visit to the Fisherville bank on Thursday last week.
About 2 o'clock, on the day in question an crew drove up in front of the bank, and two women, clearly gypsies, got out of the car and entered the bank.
