"WHAT CAN WE BELIEVE ABOUT JESUS?"

"He Said Unto Them, But Whom Say Ye That I Am?"

This is the third of a series of sermons preached by Rev. W. T. Brown, a former pastor of Knox Church, Jarvis. We will continue the series from week to week until completion.

I approach the subject for this morning's discussion with some hesitancy; not because I feel uncertain, or am not clear in my own mind about what I am going to say, but simply because I do not want, with a heavy heart, to hurt the feelings of some of you who have a certain conception of Jesus, a conception which was given to you in your earliest days, and which you have accepted ever since.

At the outset, I want to make this point clear beyond any shadow of doubt: I yield to no one in my deep love and admiration for Jesus. I believe and believe sincerely that He is the greatest leader that humanity has ever known, and that if humanity is to be saved, if this world of ours is ever to approximate to what the Creator intended it to be, it will only be because increasingly more and more men and women take Him as their guide, and begin to live His life as He lived it. In that regard I am one with many others. "I am not a Christian," said George Bernard Shaw, a few years ago, "any more than Pilate was; but I am ready to admit, after studying the works of Hurstun misery for sixty years, that I see no way out of the world's trouble, but the way Jesus would have found, had he undertaken the work of a modern, practical statesman."

No figure in all the pages of human history has attracted the attention of mankind more than this Galilean, "God's Galilean," as one writer has called him. More books have been written about Him, and still continue to be written, than about any other personage. Hardly a month passes by but some new book concerning Him comes from the press. Devoted and sincere scholars, of whom mention was made previously, have worked on all the available sources of his life, have subjected them to the closest scrutiny, have made use of every available scrap of information concerning the age in which he lived with the result that, as one writer says, "We probably know Jesus better than any generation of Christians since the days when men knew him by personal contact. "The result of this new knowledge has been two-fold, on the one hand: it has forced us to let go of some ideas concerning Jesus which we hitherto had unerringly held as incontestant, and on the other hand it has given to us a greater and a grander picture of the Master; a picture which not only commands our admiration, but staggers our imagination, and which has made us realize that the man who lived with Him was a man who could display sympathy and compassion.

You are familiar enough with the outlines of the old theological picture of Jesus so that I do not need to take up time in re-telling it for you; instead I am going to try to present to you as clearly and as briefly as I can the new picture. That are the essential elements of that picture?
In the first place we are given a picture of the real Jesus, a man as we know him. One of the most striking things which organized Christianity felt they were not revealed as they were to its Master was to give to the world a false picture of him. In recovering a clear view of the real Jesus, we see now that our childhood days, when we learned of Him in the words drawn out of the mouths of our parents, and in our hymns and sermons, were presented with an unreal manliness was an outstanding characteristic of the Jesus of history, and loving manliness were written in the records we have. "Gentle Jesus meek and mild," right by that they are to the conventional view we have been presented with an picture which the church and the world have insisted on presenting.

of sorrow, and unacquainted with grief" was the dominant idea. To-day it comes to us almost with the shock of a new revelation to read the new biographies of Him; here is no pale, ascetic, dreamy-eyed teacher, but a virile, living personage, one who moved among men, who, and what is far more difficult, held their admiration, here was a man who could be angry, blazing angry when occasion demanded it, who on the other hand could display the utmost depths of tenderness, sympathy and compassion.

Here is a man who enjoyed the company of his friends, who could sit at a feast; had a keen sense of humor; witness his parable of straining out a gnat and swallowing a camel. In short there is a man among men. True it is that in giving us these today, were not written until late in the first century; and earlier; of that that of Mark was written until somewhere between 65-80 A.D. In the interval between the death of Jesus and the writing of these Gospels tradition was busy with the figure of Jesus, and some of the results have been incorporated in the records we have. Remember this the gospels were written in an age when in order to gain a hearing for any great teacher words had to be attached to him; men were to that age the sign man-
