

A NEW SCHOOL FOR HALDIMAND

AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS

Arrangements have been completed for the holding of a three months school in Agriculture and Home Economics to be held at Caledonia, commencing on Tuesday Nov. 27th, 1934.

A. Gordon Skinner, Agricultural Representative, has been principal and the other resident instructors will be Mr. L. M. Kerr, Brockton and Mr. A. V. Langton, Waterdown with the class in Agriculture, and Miss Elizabeth Wallace, Toronto, with the class in Home Economics. A staff of itinerant lecturers will also deal with a list of special subjects.

The outline of the course a copy of which can be had on application to the Department of Agriculture, Cayuga, is quite comprehensive and very closely approximates the first year of an agricultural college. An exceptional opportunity is presented to the young people of the county to get a broad and practical education with very little effort.

Excellent hall accommodations have been arranged for the Agricultural class meeting in the Public School and Home Economics class in the Caledonia Town Hall. A strong committee is putting forth every effort to make the course a success.

Canvassers are also covering all the sections nearest to Caledonia. Mr. W. J. Williams, extremely fortunate in being selected as one of eight in the province in which schools of this kind are being held this year. A large attendance of both young men and young women is expected.

Mr. Editor:—As an item in your "Voice of the People" it may not be amiss to say a few words re the trustee election which is already in the offing.

It is a good sign to see the public taking more interest in the management and upkeep of our school. The fact that eight candidates are presenting themselves for the election to choose from, shows that this interest is very keen and also needed.

With a school cost of between seven and eight thousand dollars per year it shows that this enterprise is of some magnitude and requires skill and judgment on the part of its managing board to properly further its efficiency and necessary economical handling. There are high schools in Simcoe, Hagersville and Cayuga, built at the cost of many thousands of dollars; are we in this Village in a position to try to compete them? With the auto and good roads of today a few miles do not stand in the way of pupils going to where their fancy led them and if you build a high school that fills the bill, you have to supply it with all the costly paraphernalia that goes with it. This year the Village has paid off a bunch of school tax bills, how nice it is to find our tax bills so much reduced. Do we want to stick it all back again for a long term of years? True there is an influx of little children recently, but that is likely only temporary and can be handled easily and without going into hysterics.

The pet hobby of some inspectors, these highly paid, over efficient percentages, seems to be to order new buildings and shake the big stick over the perhaps, trembling trustees. We want a board of trustees, who will not spend a dime of the money of these gentlemen, but pursue their rightful labors untroubled and untrammelled. The inspector can neither, under the new educational system, break you, nor set you up in business.

As a suggestion, make this school a first class public school with teaching staff of the highest caliber. Mr. Smith who taught here several years ago, we have some of them here now and in a short time Jarvis will be on the map as having an educational superiority equal to any of its kind in the Province and without a lot of unnecessary expense.
