THE PROPER CARE OF YOUR AUTOMOBILE Sport Model Tops



WHILE they are made of a different material and are not coated with a varnish, as are the tops of closed cars, a certain amount of inspection and care is necessary to the upkeep of the sport model top. This style of top is made from a gray, tan or khaki coloured fabric called teal or Burbank cloth. It usually consists of two layers of closely woven cloth which are fastened together with rubber cement. When this material is new it will resist weather.
