### THE PROPER CARE OF YOUR AUTOMOBILE Fenders

THE most common mishap among motorists is of a minor nature, damage to fenders, but is oze which is liable to develop into a more serious matter if neglected. When fenders become scrawhed or scraped they should be retouched promptly to prevent rusting, because if neglected the rust is liable to eat its way through the metal. If the fender is black, it should be finished with an enamel which dries with a color and lustre closely resembling the newly baked enamel.
