To a great extent the ultimate success of the poultry enterprise will depend greatly on the manner in which the products are marketed. The discriminating customer will be attracted by the well-dressed and well-dressed chicken or fowl, and will pay a premium in price for appearance as well as quality.

A success in fattening and marketing will depend to a great extent on the operator's knowledge and ability to prepare his product in the most sanitary form.

Special feeding from ten days to three weeks will still improve the quality and pay the extra feed and labor involved. Specially bred birds with strong constitutions can stand heavy feeding with less exercise. Birds that lack vigor will make profitable gains in the selling pen.

A convenient crate, six feet long, twenty-four inches wide, and ten inches high, may be made of slats half an inch apart, and a galvanized pan beneath the floor for the droppings. Pans two feet apart will provide apartments two feet square, and accommodate four or five birds standing to sleep.

Measure freedom from lice, dust. Sift with flour of sulphur and corn good appetite by starve for three to four hours. On the weight feed and

Walpole Township Annual Nomination

The Attitude of the Ratepayers Indicate Complete Confidence in the 1935 Council. Work of the Past Year Thoroughly Covered by Members of Last Years Administration.

Weed Problem Appeared to be Only Subject of Disagreement of Taxpayers

The result of the Township nomination held on Monday would indicate that the retiring council of 1935 held the complete confidence of the ratepayers which they represent.

The financial statement reveals a comfortable balance and sound administration. The Clerk of the Township, Mr. J. J. Parsons was unanimously chosen Chairman to preside over the meeting following the closing of the nominations. The following is a complete list of the nominations:

After a few brief introductory remarks the Chairman called upon the Reeve of 1935, Mr. H. W. Parkinson. Mr. Parkinson, thoroughly and very competently reviewed the work of the council directly under his jurisdiction and also the part he was called upon to perform while representing the Township in the County Council. He especially called the attention of the ratepayers to the fact that this year on December 14 only \$7,250. was outstanding in back taxes and corresponded this figure with the taxes outstanding each year from 1931 which were as follows: 1931, \$16,000; 1932, \$31,540; 1933, \$13,000; 1934, \$12,000. This surely is an indication of more money and more general prosperity with the farmer. Mr. Parkinson dwelt at some length concerning the problem of road building and maintenance and was happy to point out that this year the Township of Walpole received 34 per cent. of the appropriation for asphalt roads in the County, or in other words out of \$21,000 set aside by the County the Township of Walpole received \$7,200 for this purpose at an average of \$1,305 per mile. He stated he did not hope that the Township of Walpole would by any means, regardless of how it was represented, receive this same appropriation another year, as the members of the Road Committee of the County Council were working collectively, entirely in the interests of the County as a whole. Mr. Parkinson also advised his hearers that the County launched a debt reduction program which was looked forward to eliminate the County debt entirely by 1948, that was of course without the necessity of any further capital expenditures.

Mr. Frank Laidlaw, who received a nomination for the Reeveship was next called to the platform amid generous applause. Mr. Laidlaw lauded the efforts of the council of 1935 and added that he was glad to learn that the County Council had through its road committee seen the advisability of permanent topped roads, which he had been an advocate of for some time and felt that it would be cheaper in the long run. Although he did not state his intentions during his brief address, Mr. Laidlaw immediately resigned from his nomination following the meeting.

Mr. Alex Hunter, Deputy Reeve for 1935 was next called to the platform. He dealt chiefly with the work in the County Council and told his fellow ratepayers that in being a representative of that body he had achieved a lifelong ambition. Mr. Hunter was associated with the communications committee of the County Council which was called upon to handle all correspondence. He stated that the insurance on the Court House had been reduced \$5,000 during 1935.

Say Goodbye To J. M. Williams

One of Firms Prominent to Popular Citizen Who Is Leaving

Gathering at the Galt Club last night, a group of businessmen said farewell to J. M. Williamson, manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce here for the past two years. He leaves next week to accept a promotion in the form of the management of the bank's branch at Dundas.

Several speeches were delivered in which regret was expressed at Mr. Williamson's removal from Galt and tribute was paid to the remarkable capacity for creating friendships and esteem which he had exhibited since coming here. A fine case of pipes was presented to him. Mr. Williamson replied expressing his regret at leaving his friends here and thanking the gathering for kind words and the gift.

William Philip presided with Mr. Williamson on his right and at his left John R. Blake, who made the presentation on behalf of the party.

Mr. Rodger Dennis covered practically every department of the Township work during his remarks and more thoroughly explained the disbursements shown in the financial statement. He pointed out the extensive sheep damage this year and felt that by individual effort of dog owners, this expense could be decreased to a marked extent. He also explained thoroughly the \$412.00 approximate expenditure on Road and truck insurance. The \$306.00 road insurance premium covers accidents caused through defective roads and bridges and covers public liability to the extent of \$10,000 for one person or \$20,000 for one accident. E. S. Pond and Earl Catherwood both took the platform and eloquently expressed their appreciation of the confidence placed in them through the results of the polls in the last election and hoped that they would merit a continuance of that confidence in the future.

Mr. H. W. Parkinson took the platform again before the close of the meeting in order that he might clarify some of the questions that had been asked. The weed controversy he stated was a matter of opinion and that he was thoroughly convinced that the present system of cutting weeds was as thorough as the previous system and the circulation of money, or in other words the tax deductions and repayments to the extent of approximately \$5,000 was eliminated. The question of the removal of the body located near Nanticoke some time this summer was settled when the meeting was advised that the action taken by the Council was on the advice of the County Crown Attorney.

Mr. Parkinson's keen and thorough endeavor to guide the Township Council combined with his ability, makes him a popular choice with the ratepayers. His earnestness in giving the people sound administration and leadership regardless of his own time and self makes him very commendable for the office which he holds.

We understand that Mr. Dennis did not qualify for the Deputy Reeveship and that the Township Council will stand the same for 1936 without an election.

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
