CHILDREN OF ASSORTED SIZES offer their own problems. One difficulty is when they come home from school at different hours for their noon meal. You can't be constantly cooking yet each must have hot appetizing, nourishing, easily-digested food. One answer is chowder and custard-like desserts.

THE KITCHEN FLOOR Since most kitchen floors these days are covered with linoleum, type of covering is due for first consideration. Linoleums are made of a cork, on a cloth foundation and then the whole is waxed or varnished over the top. Because of its porous nature and usually colored patterns, it should be given very special care.

GUIDE TO DESSERT Serve with the soup toast croutons or, toasted crackers to supply bulk, radishes and celery for crispness. When an egg salad is served with a chowder luncheon a simple dessert made without eggs is best—any instance, apple sauce and canned or fresh fruit. Fruit Betty with hard sauce, fruit tapioca pudding or plain rice pudding.

DATE PEANUTS One and one-third cups sweetened condensed milk, 2 eggs, 1-2 cup pickled dates, 1-2 cup peanut butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 unshelled egg white. Chop dates, beat eggs separately, beating yolks until thick and lemon colored. Combine milk, dates, nuts, vanilla, salt and egg yolks. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff. Turn into ungreased pie shell and put into hot oven (425 degrees F.) for ten minutes. Reduce heat an hour long for linoleum, since the use of water is not necessary.

HOME HINTS **Dog Biscuit** A good substitute for dog biscuits can be made by placing stale bread in the oven until it is as crisp as a cracker. It can be stored in a tin box and used with the dog's meat and gravy. This will save the expense of buying biscuits.

DON'TS FOR HOUSEWIVES Don't dry clean in the house. Don't leave the children locked in the house and go visiting. Don't forget to dry the family toothbrushes in the sun one day a week. Don't let the family stop out of their clothes and leave them on the floor. Insist upon their being hung up. Don't let the children be wasteful with electricity and waste lights burning all over the house. Teach them to turn them off when leaving a room. Don't leave half the contents of the food in the tin in which it came. If all is not used, turn the remainder on a china dish and put away in refrigerator to be used later.
