**THE NEW PARLIAMENT AND ITS OPPORTUNITIES**

Business conditions are improving in Canada. It is no longer impossible to expect a balanced budget or to hope that the burden of debt will be diminished by the natural processes of re-employment. Even the railways are earning more money.

But no informed student of Canadian affairs can remain unaware that there are certain basic ills in our financial and economic framework which will not yield to ordinary recuperative remedies. They demand drastic and heroic operations. They call not only for wisdom but for a high order of courage on the part of the various governments, Provincial as well as Federal.

The new Federal Government of Canada embraces a number of cleverly chosen causes that are plunging the country to its destruction. They will clearly envisage these staggering problems and they will probably be as good judges as any in the choice of solutions.

Will they have the courage of their convictions? Something will depend, in our opinion, on the obstacles that they will find themselves helped forward by a national spirit of co-operation or will they be confronted by a carping and partisan opposition? It will make all the difference in the world. There is not one of these pressing problems which does not lend itself to dangerous exploitation by partisan critics—by local grumblers—who are seeking opportunities to embarrass the Ministers and to arouse uninformed sectional feeling against what must be in their very nature heroic measures. On the other hand, good-will all around and an eye single to national advantage can enable any government to take political risks and to set national objectives against sectional sacrifices in justification of strong action.

We, for our part, are quite willing to trust this Government in its fair trial to any plans for Recovery, within reason, on which it is ready to risk its own existence. We do not fear that these newly installed Ministers will be either careless or reckless in earnest study when making their choice of measures which must save the country if they are also to save their own reputations. They have four or five years in which to work out whatever schemes they may select. They are thus protected from the always serious peril of having to submit a half-baked experiment to a less than half-informed electorate.

Time is on their side. A rising tide of national recovery is on their side. The apparent return of world-wide prosperity is on their side. They have the best possible chances for success and the most compelling reasons for taking the long view and giving to every task the deepest and most searching consideration.

They have an unmatched mandate from the people. Nothing like it, Federal and Provincial, has ever been seen in our history. A Dominion-Provincial Conference is today more like a family gathering than it could ever have been before. Partisanism automatically disappears. This malign spirit can be revived only in the course of debate on the floor of Parliament and in the Provincial legislatures.

It should not be revived anywhere.

These assemblies, too, should be composed of Canadians who have forgotten their party affiliations or their previous conditions of mental servitude, and who have come together as sincere and earnest men to face the most tremendous series of political problems that this young country has ever known. Where political risks must be taken, they should be met by a united front. Sectional selfishness should find no comfort on either side or in any corner of the House.

While this homecoming spirit prevails a wise Government will perform whatever arduous and dangerous and back-breaking tasks may lie before it. Then there will be ample time for the wounds to heal, for the national benefits of any drastic reforms to develop and for those national benefits completely to overshadow and erase minor sectional grievances.

The Mackenzie King Government has already moved rapidly. It has signed a Reciprocity Agreement with the United States which has aroused singularly little opposition in this country. It has held a Dominion-Provincial Conference that approved the foundations for a close study of the whole question of co-operation. It has relieved the strain in our trade relations with Japan. It has opened conversations with the British Government looking to a more friendly interpretation of our common desire to augment Empire trade.

It is quite true that the proof of the pudding is in the eating—and some of the puddings have not yet been so much as mixed. It will be the duty of Parliament to examine every proposal with care and to point out any features which seem to promise trouble. No one will want to say that the national and historic duty of the people's representatives is to sit in judgment on the advisers of the Crown shall be abated or abandoned.

But what every taxpayer hoping for relief, every citizen hoping for solvency, every Canadian thinking only of Canada, will want above all is that no member of Parliament shall speak only for little Podunk or shall seek to manufacture partisan capital out of the fundamental difficulties that must confront this or any other Government.

What we want is a long pull and a strong pull and a pull all together. Let us assume for the present that this is the only Government we can get and that we must all help it. It will be time enough to talk of alternative governments when such things become practical politics. In the meantime, let us pool all our resources in solving the railway problem, in reducing the interest burden of our railways, in cutting down heroically the costs of government, in "selling" Dominion credit to the Provinces for some measure of Dominion control over Provincial expenditures, in lessening the drain of "relief" in really balancing our budgets, in its swift, breath-taking descent to the very brink of bankruptcy.

Presbyterian Church Sees "Spiritual Revival"

Recommendations that a special meeting of Toronto Presbyterians be called for prayer and to discuss evangelism, and that all churches in the Presbytery hold special evangelistic services before Easter, were carried at the regular monthly meeting of Presbytery held recently in Knox Church.

"Unmistakable signs that there is an undercurrent existing of a deep spiritual revival on the way," was noted in the report presented by Rev. William Allan, speaking for the Committee on Church Life and Work.

**We Mourn His Passing**

The passing of King George V, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the seas, King, Defender of the faith, emperor of India, has veiled in mourning the greatest Empire of all time. Canada bows her head in grief in the lamentable passing of the greatest monarch of his time and of modern times. The rich, the poor, the mighty, the humble, the weak, and the strong all are proud to bow in reverence, respectful of his benevolent reign. Since his accession to the throne over Twenty-five years ago we have seen thrones shaken and emptied, Empires turned into commonwealths and republics; we have seen a world reeling in the chaos of war and of post-war confusion, yet his sceptre alone stood upright and Britain was ever sure. The late King George will live in history as a King who led his empire in dark days; but still more as a King who came closer than any other monarch to the hearts of his subjects. He dignified the throne which he inherited by his courage and faithfulness. He was a friend to all and joined wholeheartedly in the joys and sorrows of his nation.

Throughout the period of the Great War his outstanding leadership and ability was more vividly exemplified and through his loyalty to his subjects and the loyalty of his subjects to him was there established a permanent feeling of love and respect that have been built upon throughout his entire reign.

"The man was King in England's direst need; In the Black-battle years, after hope was gone, His courage was a flag men rallied on. His steadfast spirit showed him King indeed. And when the war was ended, when the thought Of revolution took its hideous place, His courage and his kindness and his grace Scattered (or charmed) its ministers to naught. No King of all our many has been proved By times so savage to the thrones of Kings, Or won more simple triumph over fate; He was most Royal among Royal things, Most thoughtful for the meanest in his state, The best, the gentlest, and the most beloved."

One cannot help but recall the King's Christmas messages; when we think that that voice has been stilled, that we cannot look forward to his messages to his people in the future; we are sad, yet we can recall with happiness and pride his words last December 25 that reached the far corners of the earth: "It is the personal link between me and my people that I value more than I can say. It binds us together in all our common joys and sorrows," also "It is good to think that our own family of peoples is at peace in itself and united in one desire to be at peace with other nations—a friend to all, the enemy of none." He also endeared himself to his people by referring to his gracious consort, Queen Mary, as "my dear wife."

Our sincere sympathy goes out to Her Majesty, the Queen and to members of the Royal Family, bereaved by the death of a devoted husband and father, and we mourn the passing of a truly great monarch, His late Majesty, King George V of England.
