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FIRE-RETARDANT WOOD CHEMISTRY'S LATEST. Coinciding with the statement of United States builders and insurance men that the United States fire losses for 1935 amounted to 10,000 human lives and cost \$245,000,000, comes a report from the National Board of Fire Underwriters containing an assurance that there is such a thing as fire-retardant wood. The wood tested by the Board was red oak and maple which had been treated and uniformly impregnated in pressure tanks containing ammonium salts, a fireproofing compound which, it is not perhaps generally known, has actually been procurable in Canada for at least two years.

FIRE-RETARDANT WOOD CHEMISTRY'S LATEST. The treated wood is almost the same in appearance as ordinary wood but is a little heavier because of the salt content. It is easily worked and takes varnish well. The investigators of the Board tested the treated wood under conditions that sent untreated walls and floors roaring up in flames while the treated wood did not turn at all to the fierce heat was deeply charred. Not once, however, did the treated wood flame or shed the spread of combustion. The National Board of Fire Underwriters' final verdict was that the wood was non-inflammable.
