Haldimand Historical Society

We were highly gratified at the attendance and marked interest in the March meeting of this organization.

We enrolled several new members received many letters of appreciation of our "Review" and assuring us of co-operation in our efforts. Representatives from several of the W. I. branches were present and several contributions to what we may justly call our "Museum" were received.

Among these were some pictures, from the home of the first Warden of the County, Edmund Decew, and one of the ruins of Ballville school, these from Mr. Harrison of Hagersville.

The perhaps most interesting item of the programme was an outline of county history prepared from Dr. Thomas Harrison's Diary. Dr. Harrison was identified with widely different phases of the county's activities.

The son of a pioneer physician, he was himself a successful doctor and surgeon, performing skillful and successful operations under circumstances which would be appalling to the surgeons of to-day in their "germ-proof" environments.

Among his other interesting early newspaper publications and prominent in political circles, without personal ambitions for he twice refused a Senatorship so that he speaks with authority in his diary and the story from it is valuable indeed to the society.

The Dr. died at the age of ninety full possession of his mental faculties. "As long as I am alive, I want to live," he said one day to the writer and he certainly did "live" to the end.
