The United States Trade Treaty And The Canadian Farmer

Ottawa, March 25.—Will the United States trade treaty do some-thing FOR the Canadian farmer, or is it more likely to do something TO him?

In the main, that has been the question which has been the subject of the past few days. Obviously, it is one which goes pretty much to the heart of the agreement, inasmuch as the interests of the farmer in the pact was concluded ostensibly in the interests of primary producers and while represented as not in-terfering with industrial workers—without claiming any direct benefits for the farmer.

So far as the agricultural side of the arrangements is concerned, how- ever, the Federal legislators, since the first treaty concluded to come under the clause examination in the Committee stage, have been hearing a somewhat mixed story. The first point raised was that the pact was not a trade treaty, but a tariff treaty, particularly the price of pork the past few years the price of pork in Canada has been regularly from three cents to four and one-half cents per pound higher than in the United States.

Under the new trade treaty, how- ever, the situation will be totally changed. The Canadian duty against the United States product on pork from five cents per pound to one and one-quarter cents per pound. That is the figure at which it stood when 14,000,000 pounds of American pork was imported into the Dominion annually. The United States Secretary of Agriculture, Hon.
