WHAT ABOUT THE PIANO

A funny heading you will say, no doubt. Nevertheless there appears to be just such a thing requiring attention for the winter months. The piano at the present time is in the auditorium of the Jarvis Arena where the weather at its best is frosty after the first of October. The situation regarding the piano is just this. The Jarvis Booster Club which will recall, functions with such perfect harmony until a year ago last spring and then finally disbanded, left the piano in the arena for the benefit of any social functions that might take place there. The only stipulation was that it must be given proper care at all times and above all removed from the icy atmosphere during the winter months. Last year, when the organization known as the Arena Club operated from the arena building, this stipulation was lived up to. They have, however, ceased to active and their lease ran out in September of this year.

The piano is still the property of the Booster Club and unless someone else along the lines of their former stipulation, there is the probability that they will sell or dispose of the piano as they see fit. If they do, the result of social functions in the arena, therefore if the officials of the arena club have the further desire to operate the building for such purposes, it might be advisable for them to act immediately while the opportunity is theirs.

The Jarvis Council were only recently presented with a resolution requesting action to be taken within the Municipality. ELECTRIC PLOUGH USED IN ENGLAND

Electric ploughing was one of the subjects dealt with at the recent World Power Conference in Washington, U.S.A. and mention was made of the only electric plough in England which has been in use for the past twelve years on a farm in East Grinstead. The equipment consists of a two-wheeled carriage upon which is mounted a 12 h.p. motor, complete with starting switch and speed reduction gear, as well as two cable drums, either of which can be driven at will by means of the motor.

The equipment is anchored in a convenient position in the field and adjacent to the overhead lines. The cable drums are connected to the overhead lines by means of a cable drum and a cable drum. The speed of ploughing is from one-third to one acre per hour, varying with the nature of the soil and the depth of furrow ploughed. Five acres a day is the average with such a small unit.
