SHORT COURSE

The classes in Agriculture and Home Economics wish to express their thanks to the "Record" for this opportunity of presenting their topics in connection with the work of the classes for the next twelve weeks. In a modest way it is hoped to present new ideas of things that have taken place and of future things to come.

The classes also wish to express thanks to the "Record" for the assistance which it has already rendered in acquainting the public with the purposes and objects of the course.

The opening on Tuesday went over with a bang. Over ninety students were on hand to greet the staff at nine o'clock. This number has since been considerably augmented and the total enrolment at time of going to treat was one hundred and four. (See list of students elsewhere in this issue.)

The opening ceremonies were most impressive and as so well expressed by Mr. Simpson of the staff in Agriculture, "no one could be present without feeling the importance of making the most of this opportunity to improve one's education." A complete account of this program is given on page one.

The class in Home Economics is rapidly getting settled. Space is somewhat at a premium but the staff and local committee are doing everything possible to accommodate the large and enthusiastic group of interested students. The classroom is most comfortable with ample light and good ventilation.

The local committee as well as both classes acknowledge with appreciation the efforts which have been put forth by so many individuals to make the course a success and to run smoothly. Special mention should be made of the new Westinghouse refrigerator supplied through the kindness of Mr. Wilfred Willis and the new McCarly cabinet range provided by Mr. W. J. Elliott.

This equipment is much appreciated by the girls.

The lecture work in the Home Economics class this week is largely basic in nature and will act as a foundation for future work. Miss Sambridge, has been dealing with food values and nutrition while Miss Wight has been discussing the fundamentals in interior decoration.

A new cupboard is being built for use in the girls' classroom. It was much needed for the storage equipment and the local committee and Board of Trade immediately came to the rescue.

The old saying, "Give a cat more rope and it will hang itself," became almost a reality in the boy's class on Tuesday afternoon when a start was made on the subject of "Rope-work on the Farm." Over six hundred boys in the class made a start in making rope halters for calves, sheep, cows, etc. Practically every boy in the class made a rope halter. This work will be continued at the next ropework period on Wednesday next, December 1st.

Lecture work at the class in Agriculture began in real earnest on Wednesday morning when Mr. Simpson, not divulging some of his secret, made a magic of chemistry and its practical application to the farm. A demonstration was given of making common salt, but most of the boys decided they still preferred to purchase this commodity ready made.

Crops and crop production was the subject discussed by Mr. McKinnon and during Wednesday afternoon, the boys were given the opportunity of going over a few classes of grain and to pass their judgment on them.

Work in Live Stock Judging is being started this afternoon (Thursday) when the entire class in Agriculture visits the farm of Mr. Eben Cowan to go over some classes of dual purpose, Shorthorn. Other classes of stock are being arranged for but the details were not available at time of writing.

Nominations for class executives will take place at both class rooms on Monday next, November 30th. A list of the nominees will be published in the "Record" on Friday afternoon. The executive committee of three is required for each class as well as Editors, reporters, etc. If more than the required number are nominated, an election will take place the following Friday, December 4th.

The first meeting of the Literary Society to be held to-morrow (Friday) afternoon is taking the form of a reception for the members of the two classes and is being put on by the Jarvis Women's Institute and the local committee. A full attendance of members of the classes is expected.

The executive for the Literary Society to take charge of the meeting on December 4th, will be appointed Friday afternoon.

Farm Forestry is the subject to be dealt with on Wednesday next, December 2nd, when Mr. I. C. Marshall, the Forestry Branch, Toronto, will visit the class. Problems connected with the farm woodlot, pruning, etc., will be discussed and roadside trees will be discussed as well as the ornamentation of farm buildings and the use of trees in the landscape. It is expected that the talk will be illustrated by coloured slides.

Pond, who has had several years experience on the local council since he was elected to the position of Reeve last year and a one time unsuccessful candidate for the Reevehip.

A large attendance of members were present from throughout the Southern Counties District. The members participated in a cream and butter grading competition, and election of officers for the ensuing year took place.

The guest speaker was introduced by Mr. Marshall of Jarvis, and his remarks were keenly appreciated by his hearers.

New Men Nominated for Council

Those who qualified and declared elected by acclamation were Albert Booth, E. T. Carter, A. L. Miller and N. R. Pond.
