Farm Fire Prevention

(Continued from page one) from the blower mouth. Barn doors should be locked at night to keep out evil minded persons. We finally arrive at one conclusion. To prevent fires we must have closer co-operation and mutual help between agents, directors, policy holders, companies and insurance departments.

One week of each year is set aside by the province for Fire Prevention to convince our people of the seriousness of great fire waste. Fire prevention may be advocated through articles in the press, literature and Motion Pictures. Farm fire prevention is being taught to the children in our schools, and addresses are given several times a year at our Women's Institutes. The radio is a valuable aid in educating our people on means of protection against fire losses.

The report of the Fire Marshall for Ontario shows many changes in the staff with a marked increase in efficiency and education. Farm fires from all causes have decreased steadily from one hundred and thirty-one. A special campaign is being continued this year. We name nineteen that died and thirty-six as "The year of least farm fires."
