PHEASANT SHOOTING DAYS ARE ANNOUNCED Minister of Game and Fisheries Fixes Two Days Open Season for 1936.

Two days pheasant shooting, October 22 and 23, have been fixed in the counties of Haldimand, Essex, Kent, and Middlesex Counties by order-in-council of the Department of Game and Fisheries.

The bag limit per day will be two cock birds. Hens must not be shot on an article of food or mounted later than November 20. Shooting each day will be restricted to six hours of eight in the morning to five in the afternoon, standard time. In Essex, Kent and Middlesex Counties, hunters may also take three quail each day.

The first two days of the annual Pelee Island pheasant hunt as announced recently will also be held this year on October 22 and 23. The second two days on Pelee are October 29 and 30, the daily bag limit per day here is five birds two of which must be hen birds. For each two-day shoot a hunter must pay \$2.00 into the Pelee Township treasury, in addition to carrying the regular provincial license.
