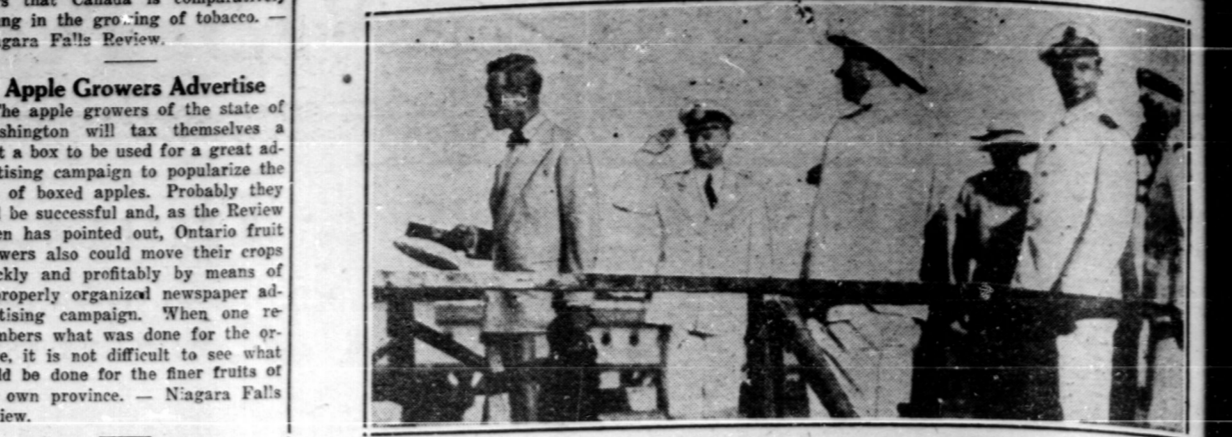
Women in Banking

Edward VIII. King of England (left), leads party ashore at Athens, Greece, as yacht beached and rescued from drowning when skiff overturned at Aegina.

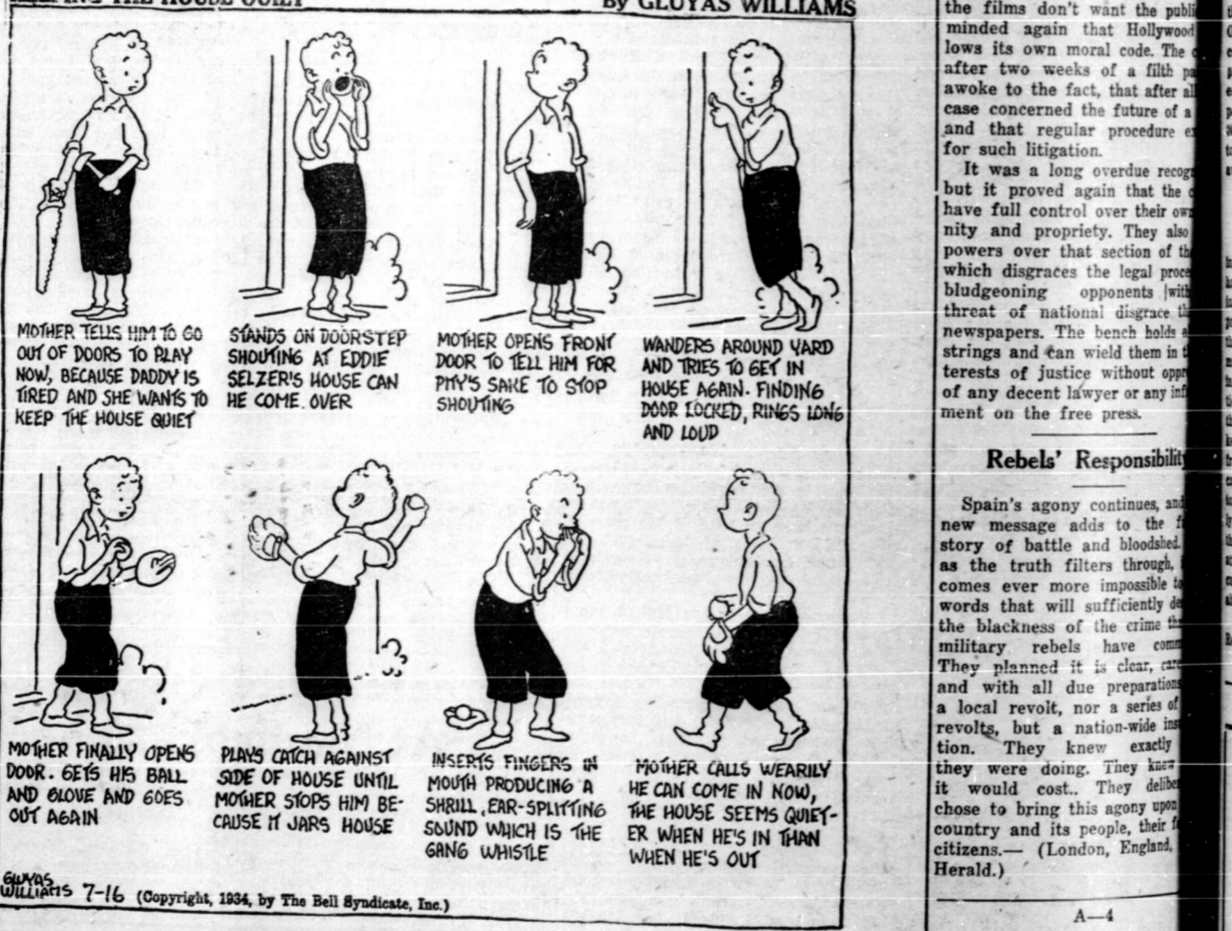

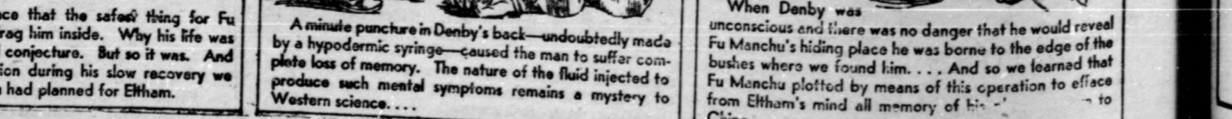
