Mental Mix-Ups Cause Left-Handedness

NEW YORK - Puzzling cases of children who struggle along in school, writing backwards and transschool, writing backwards and transposing figures in their arithmetic sums, apparently are manifestations of a peculiar mental mix-up in which the brain lobe, which should direct the operations, fails to establish the necessary domination, Dr. Samuel T. Orton, professor of neurology and neuropathology at Columbia University, said here.

A recent case of the type was Adelard Cormier, a 10-year-old school-boy at Grand Etang, N. S. Since the boy entered school, four years ago, he has read with his book upside down, written from the right-

upside down, written from the right-hand side of his composition paper and set down combinations or num-bers in reverse."

The more serious language mix-ups, Dr. Orton explained, occur when a child is neither strongly "left-sided" or "right-sided," when he is never entirely sure which is the dominant, directing side. Such

More Canadian Bacon Goes To Great Britain

OTTAWA.-Exports of Canadian bacon to Great Britain have increased considerably in past years. In 1933 they totalled 71,524,700 pounds, in 1934 they rose to 119,707,600 pounds and in 1936 to 124,327,900 pounds. In 1936 shipments to the British maraket amounted to to the British maraket amounted to 147,688,800 pounds valued at \$25,-

147,688,800 pounds valued at \$25,138,590.

Great care is being taken by
Canada to maintain the high quality of her bacon exports to the
British markete and to assure a continuity of supplies. All packing
plants must be licensed to export
Wiltshire bacon. The bacon is
graded and stamped "Canada" together with the grades A, B, or C.
On arrival in England each shipment undergoes an additional inment undergoes an additional in-spection by a Canadian Government inspector. Each Canadian packing house is required to estimate the amount of bacon it plans to ship each month of the year. This syseach month of the year. This sys-tem is designed to keep the ship-ments within a 5 per cent. variation in the quantity from week to week in order to prevent wide fluc-tuations in the supplies going for-
