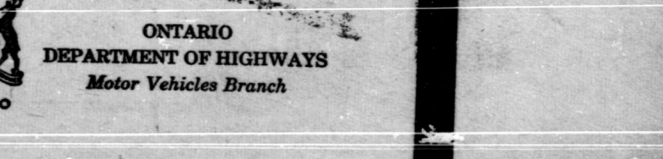


DEATH STALKS OUR HIGHWAYS!
