pical countries which supply us with such commodities as rubber, tea, coffee, sugar and tropical fruits will be more than half a million. For example the Straits Settlements sold us last year 15 million tons of rubber and brought from us 2 and a half million. Our sales to British Guiana were one million and our purchases from the South American British country were between 5 and 6 million.
