

Namby - Pamby Feeling Towards Cancer Must Stop

BUFFALO, N.Y .- Thirty thousand women who die each year from cancer could be saved if they knew how to recognize its warning signals, a state cancer expert avers.
Dr. Louis C. Kress, assistant director of New York State's division of cacer control, said at a meeting of health officers that 16,000 women die yearly of cancer of the uterus, and 14,000 from cancer of the

breast.

"There's a namby pamby attitude that prevents plain talk about this enemy of mankind," Dr. Kress said. "The biggest public service we can do to cut the toll of lives is to inform all women in plain language of the danger of a lump in the breast, and of the warnings of uterine tumors. Any lump, large or small, in the breast should be reported to a physician, and his advice asked.

In Your Garden

By GORDON L. SMITH

(ARTICLE 4.) When purchasing supplies, authorities emphasize importance of obtaining fresh nursery stock and from a reliable Canadian source. Roots and stems of good nursery stock are moist and pliable, and in stock are moist and phable, and in the case of shrubs and vines, the upper growth will show evidence of plenty of green, live buds. They are stored and usually sold from cool, tarkened quarters. Before planting it is well to trim back the upper growth somewhat to offset any shearing off of the roots, and it is not advisable to allow too much plooming of the plants the first

In 1918 Canada's fish production was worth \$60,000,000 but today, due to depressed conditions in foreign markets, the value is down to approximately \$35,000,000.
