THUMB-SUCKING AND

These are among the most common "undesirable habits" that child ren develop, and often, if neglected, they are the most difficult to extract.

It is unwise to punish the child for such habits. Apart from having absolutely no effect on the habit in seclusion. Often an intense feeting of guilt is aroused. Applying bitter substances to the thumb or fingers is not of much use. Repeated commands such as "stop rucking your thumb" are seidom success tul. The importance of the habit should not be emphasized in this way. Neither should it be discussed with other adults in the child's presence. Such procedures only impress the child with the fact that he is a "thumb-sucker," and he will do his best to live up to his reputation.

In an infant or very young child it is best to ignore completely such practices. Simply remove the hand
