

highway extensions and \$2,000,000 for public buildings. At the same time, the government is budgeting for a surplus of \$2,282,000 after allowing \$11,000,000 for relief.

The budget has been generally ac claimed as "an honest and sound public accounting", it being pointed out that the Province could have recorded a surplus of twenty millions instead of seven if direct relief costs had been capitalized.
