27th damages in the Prairie provinces, particularly Saskatchewan. The large harvest in the United States offsets this gain. By the fall months it was felt that prices had reached levels pretty well in line with the situation in general. The price of wheat throughout the world. This may be true, but who would have the temerity to prophesy what might happen if the break in the stock markets should bring about or precede a recession in general industrial activity in the United States and elsewhere? What markets cannot be divorced from general industrial conditions.

Canada's Trade With United States

For twelve months ending September Canada's exports of domestic products to the United States amounted to \$480,033,945 compared with \$380,080,875 in the previous twelve months. While imports from that country were \$465,697,596 compared with \$345,563,290. Exports to Great Britain were \$374,834,618, while imports from the United Kingdom were \$345,363,212 compared with \$321,082,250. The trade treaties with the two countries were at least contributory factors in the increased figures. Sales to Britain suffered through an approximately 25 per cent reduction in the volume of wheat shipments. Higher prices fortunately helped to offset this decline. It is to be noted that while for every \$100 worth of goods sold to the United States we purchase \$80 in return, the case of the United Kingdom we buy only \$35 for every \$100 exported. Actually our surplus from British trade in export figures over sales of wheat to that market. If wheat exports were not included we would still sell almost double the amount imported.

It would seem that this situation, in some degree, has been rectified if we can hope to keep our favored position in that most important market.
