### Home Hints

- THE THANKSGIVING FEAST**
- Thanksgiving and homecoming! They seem synonymous, don't they? Sons and daughters bringing their friends home from boarding schools, end, nature radiant in her autumn colors, and radiant faces around your family table! Make this a real day to plan your Thanksgiving dinner and the memory of which will last till next year.
- Here is a suggested menu that covers everything from cocktail to nuts. It can be the basis on which to build your Thanksgiving dinner, and whatever changes and additions suit your own particular family.
- 2 cups coconut, premium shred
  - 1/2 teaspoon eye
  - 1 teaspoon scraped onion
  - 1 egg, slightly beaten
  - 2 tablespoons melted butter
  - Combine with remaining ingredients, mixing lightly. Pack stuffing in loosely. It expands while cooking. This stuffing can also be used for duck, goose, pork, or turkey.
  - Season with salt and pepper.
  - Bake in hot oven (450 to 500 Deg. F.) 45 minutes, or until done.
  - Remove from oven, cut lengthwise in halves, and scoop out insides. Mash, and mix with melted butter, salt, and pepper. Add hot milk and whip until fluffy. Fill mixture into potato shells and bake in hot oven (450 Deg. F.) 5 to 8 minutes or until browned.
  - Stuffed potatoes are a wise choice for a large dinner, because they can be prepared ahead of time and simply heated in time for dinner.
  - Mould will be a delightful change from ordinary cranberry sauce. It's new, delicious and lovely to look at.
  - 1 package lemon flavored jelly powder
  - 1 cup thick cranberry sauce, sweetened
  - 1 cup warm water
  - 1/2 cup cranberry sauce
  - 1/2 cup warm water
  - 1/2 cup canned crushed pineapple
  - Dissolve jelly in warm water. Chill. When slightly thickened, add cranberry sauce, and the cranberry sauce. Turn into mould. Chill until firm.
  - The Russian dressing for the salad is made by combining:
    - 1 tablespoon chili sauce
    - 1/2 teaspoon vinegar
    - 1 cup mayonnaise
    - 1/2 teaspoon paprika
    - 1 tablespoon pimiento, chopped finely
  - Pumpkin Pie
    - 1 1/2 cups coconut, premium shred
    - 2 cups cooked mashed pumpkin
    - 1 cup sugar
    - 1/2 teaspoon salt
    - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
    - 1/2 teaspoon allspice
    - 3 tablespoons melted butter
    - 2 eggs, slightly beaten
    - 2 cups milk, scalded
    - Line a 9-inch pie plate with pastry, rolled to 1/8 inch thickness. Combine ingredients in order given and mix thoroughly. Pour into pie shell. Bake in hot oven (450 Deg. F.) 20 minutes, then decrease heat to moderate (350 Deg. F.) and bake 30 minutes longer.

### Will Finance 45,000 Families

The Dominion will provide direct relief for 45,000 families in Saskatchewan this winter together with feed and fodder for their livestock. Agriculture Minister Gardiner announced this week.

Ravages of persistent drought have raised the number of relief families from 25,000 last year. Estimates for drought areas in other parts of the West are still to be made.

Ominous signs of scurvy have appeared in the West, the minister said, as a result the government will launch a scheme to move large quantities of surplus fish, cheese, vegetables and fruit from other parts of Canada into the drought areas.

In addition to providing direct relief in the areas of greatest suffering the Dominion will make direct grants-in-aid to the provinces to help municipalities on the border of the drought belt.

are the beloved of God. "And kept for Jesus Christ." The word here translated "kept" occurs five times in this single chapter—here, twice in v. 6, once in v. 13, where it is translated "reserved," and a final time in v. 21. The word suggests watchful care and is suggestive of present possession. It is the same word three times used by our Lord in his wonderful intercessory prayer in John 17. Jude is so confident of God's purpose to keep us that he links it inseparably with and makes it to be a very part of our calling, and the fact of our being loved by God. We are kept day by day from those things which would harm our souls.

That which alone can come between us and God is sin. It is God alone who can deliver us from the power of either of these, and from the weakness and wicked inclinations of our own flesh.

"Mercy unto you and peace and love be multiplied." This sentence is a beautiful expression of the grace of God which is found in all of the New Testament of the words of the apostle Paul—"Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good." The way to build ourselves up on our faith is by doing the things which Jude now admonishes. "Praying in the Holy Spirit." To pray in the Holy Spirit is to pray in accordance with the leading of the Holy Spirit who dwells in us. Consequently, all prayers will be characterized by holiness and by spirituality.

"Keep yourselves in the love of God." It is not, "Keep God loving you." But we need to keep in the conscious enjoyment of it. We keep ourselves in the love of God primarily by doing those things which please Him. "Looking for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ unto eternal life." We are to continually look for our Lord to come back at which time we know that mercy will prevail. At this time we shall come into the full apprehension of and the full realization of the eternal life which, as a gift, was bestowed upon us when we accepted our Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour.

"And on some have mercy, who are in doubt. And some save, snatching them out of the fire; and on some have mercy with fear; hating even the garment spotted by the flesh."—As the Lord has been merciful toward us, so should we be merciful toward others, and especially must this be observed as we deal with those who have come into the darkness of doubt, or have fallen into some great sin.

"Now unto him that is able to guard you from stumbling." The concluding sentence of Jude's epistle is one of the richest, if not the richest doxology to be found at the end of any of the New Testament writings.

"But ye, beloved, building up yourselves on your most holy faith."

### Insect Is Speed Champion of World

Cephenomyia Can Travel at 818 Miles Per Hour

Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews, this week at New York, awarded the world speed championship to an air racer named cephenomyia, a kind of bug which has been clocked at 818 miles an hour.

"Around World in a Day" is the name of the insect. The American Museum of Natural History, writing in the October issue of "Natural History," that:

"It was possible to drive an airplane at the speed of cephenomyia for 17 hours continuously, we could go all around the world in a daylight day. Eight hundred and eighteen miles an hour is approximately twice as fast as our fastest planes."

Insects are better fliers than birds, Dr. Andrews says, because they have a heritage of several million years in nature's trial and error flying school, whereas birds have been around only about 125,000,000 years.

"So far the insects may be ahead," he concludes, "but man has only recently spread his wings—and the sky is the limit."

### Barkless Dogs Are New Craze

Are Useful Pets in Cities Carrying on Anti-Noise Campaign

Those New Yorkers who take their anti-noise campaign seriously have something more to cheer about than the departure of the American Legionnaire. That's when the barkless dog made its North American debut this week.

Incredible as it may seem, the dogs really don't bark. They are born that way; no bark-removing operations have to be performed. Natives of the Congo in Africa, the barkless dog makes known to the Africans as Basenji, which are excellent hunters, although they can make themselves heard with only a sort of growl or rumble.

Dog lovers never heard of these animals until last December, when a few breeds of them were taken to England by Mrs. Olivia Burn, an Englishwoman who found them in the Belgian Congo. In the last ten months the Basenji have been bred and shown in England, and attractively considerable attention. Two barkless, but otherwise alert and playful puppies arrived from their English birthplace aboard the Borengaria.
