

Ravages of persistent drought have raised the number of relief families from 25,000 last year. Estimates for drought areas in other parts of the West are still to be made.

Ominous signs of scurvy have appeared in the West, the minister said, and as a result the government will launch a scheme to move large quantities of surplus fish, cheese, vegetables and fruit from other parts of Canada into the drought areas.

Get one that is well padded with fat and make sure that the breast bone is pliable by moving the end of the bone farthest from the head, from side to side. Another point to remember is that the legs of a young turkey are black and smooth, those of an old

After you have washed, singed and drawn the turkey, stuff it and then truss and tie it. Place on back on a trivet in a roasting pan, and rub the entire outside surface with salt. Baste frequently during the roasting. If there is not enough fat in the pan for basting, use a mixture of 1/4 cup of butter melted in two-thirds cup boiling water. After this is gone, use fat in pan. Turn turkey frequently, that it may brown evenly. Turkey should be roasted at 350 Deg. F., for the whole period, allowing 20 minutes


