worthy as the index of the volume of business was 123.0 compared with 123.4 in August. In common stock prices, one of the 46 factors used in compiling the economic index there was the most drastic declina. These prices dropped 12 per cent. Mining was slightly down, while the timber trade. including pewsprint production advanced. Manufacturing was about on a level keel. Compared, however, with September of last year this September showed a marked advance in practically every branch of industrial activity.

Canada's export trade in September amounted to 94.2 million dollars which was 9.1 million under the August figure but 5.3 million dollars over September 1936. Shipments to the United States amounted to 44.0 million in September 1936. Sales to the United Kingdom were 33.2
