### Dyentery Epidemic at The Pas

THE PAS, Man.—Believed to have been caused by contaminated food, water or milk, a widespread epidemic of bacillary dysentery, an intestinal infection, has taken the lives of four children in this district and affected 15 persons in The Pas during the past month.

### Italy Wins Air Derby

LEBOURGIER FIELD, Paris.—The Italian pilot Capini crossed the finish line first in the latest-Danube-Paris 2,000-mile air derby at 10:08 a.m. The winner, however, was decided on the basis of elapsed time. Capini, who was the pilot of the plane, was the winner of first prize of one and a half million francs (\$55,200).

### Andrew Mellon Leaves Fortune of \$50,000,000

SOUTHINGTON, N.Y.—At the age of 82, Andrew W. Mellon, who built one of the world's greatest fortunes out of banking, oil and aluminum and who spent his late years in the nation's service as secretary of the treasury and as ambassador to Great Britain, has passed from the American scene. He died this week-end without making a last statement or request.

### Settles Quebec Strike

QUEBEC.—Premier Maurice Duplessis of Quebec announced this week-end that the twenty-six-day-old strike of Dominion Textile Company's 15,000 workers had been settled following a round-table conference between the Government and the workers.

### Franco Thanks Mussolini

ROME.—Premier Benito Mussolini, casting aside all pretense of neutrality, boasted this week-end that twelve Italian Generali led the Spanish soldiers into Santander on the Northern Biscay coast. It was revealed, in an official announcement, that the "black arrow" brigade of Italians in Franco's ranks suffered 2,017 casualties in 11 days during the drive along the Biscay coast through Castro Urdiales, Laredo and then into Santander.

### Seven-Mile Jump

MOSCOW.—K. F. Kaitanov claimed a new parachute jumping record of 11,047 feet (about 3,620 feet). He said this bettered his old mark of 9,800 feet (about 32,150 feet), made in July.

### King Farouk Engaged

CAIRO.—The engagement of Egypt's crown prince, King Farouk to Miss Saad Nasr, 16-year-old daughter of Youssouf Bey Zulfikar, councillor of the Alexandria Mixed Court of Appeals, was officially announced this week.

### Chinese Prepare For Bigger Battle

SHANGHAI.—China's most brilliant military strategist, General Pai Huan-chung, announced 300,000 men in the boggy lakes district thirty-five miles west of this week-end, and prepared for the greatest fighting of the war.

### First Paralysis Death in Manitoba

WINNIPEG.—First death from infantile paralysis since the light outbreak began in June, was recorded here this week. Emily Johnson, 26, a native of the city, died at the Winnipeg hospital, and called on Pat, once his bitter enemy, to be the "Marshall" of his clan.

### Berlin Survey New Air Way

BERLIN.—Lufthansa, Germany's leading aviation company, announced this week three Reich liners in a trimotored plane flew from Kabul, Afghanistan, to Amnifan, in the south-western extremity of Kans Province in China, a distance of about 1,500 miles, in 11 hours.

### First Daylight Atlantic Flight Successful

BOTWOOD, Nfld.—Imperial Airways flying boat Cambria landed here at 9:05 p.m., E.D.T., Friday, on her first daylight transatlantic flight from Foynes, Ireland. The Cambria made the crossing in 14 hours, 26 minutes.

### British's Near-Ultimatum

LONDON.—As British public opinion flared violently because of the shooting of Sir Hargis Knatchbull-Hugessen, British Ambassador to China, and the United States directed sharp notes declaring its intention to "maintain" all its rights and privileges in the Orient, the international situation arising from the Sino-Japanese conflict became decidedly more critical this week-end.

### Cross Atlantic in 11 1/2 Hours

POYNES, Irish Free State.—Imperial Airways flying ship Cambria, on the 19th day of her first daylight transatlantic flight, crossed the Atlantic in 11 1/2 hours.

# Ontario Paralysis Epidemic Has Yet to Reach Its Peak

### In Opinion of Toronto Health Authorities—Deaths From Infantile Paralysis Are Reported From London and Barrie Districts—Precautions to be Taken.

An alarming increase in the number of infantile paralysis cases in the Toronto district was reported this week-end and indications were that the epidemic had by no means reached its peak. A survey showed that each day a larger number of new cases than the previous day had been reported over a period of several days.

Every available means of taking care of the number of cases was being pressed into service. Although official confirmation could not be obtained, it was learned that the various hospitals were being held to ascertain how best an increasing number of cases could be handled. Medical men at the Hospital for Sick Children on Saturday afternoon and paid tribute to the work being carried on by the medical men and other workers there, caused the adequacy of the area to take care of the situation.

### Air Service Delayed

Unless special legislation is enacted in the U. S. Congress, another year may go by before the projected trans-Atlantic air mail route between London and New York is inaugurated. The United States is inaugurating. Meantime test flights continue to be carried out from both sides of the Atlantic.

### Blood of Dead Aids Cancer Fight

Russian Surgeons Get Good Results in 1,000 Cases

LONDON.—A new era in the surgical treatment of cancer has been opened as the result of Russian experiments in the transfusion of blood from the dead according to Professor S. S. Yudin, chief surgeon of the surgical clinic of the Sklifovskiy Institute in Moscow.

### Tourist Boom

Reaching the proportions of a major industry, the tourist influx into Canada from the United States and other countries, in this year expected to swell Canadian cities, public and private, by the addition of 3,000,000. During the month of August alone, nearly one million United States cars will have crossed over into Canada.

### Dinosaur Aged 80,000,000

BILLINGS, Mont.—Discovery of an "arm" bone and dinosaur footprints 64 inches long and 32 inches wide were reported this week by Dr. Barnum Brown, Curator of the American Museum of Natural History.

### Times Attacks Mussolini

In a speech at Palermo, Premier Mussolini of Italy issued a warning that Rome and Berlin would never permit "Bolshevism or something like that" to establish itself on the shores of the Mediterranean. The London (Eng.) Times immediately attacked Mr. Duce, taking it that his warning implied "exclusive Italian control" in that area.

### Rain Hail Harvest

Harvesting operations in Ontario have been at a standstill due to the excessive rains and hail. The fields have been so saturated that no bumper crop is either!

### Prison Commission

Appointed to inquire into the administration of penal institutions in Canada, the Penitentiary Commission headed by Mr. Justice Giesse, has concluded their study of the systems on the Continent of Europe and in England. They will shortly complete their report on the investigation of the best methods of dealing with prisoners in a number of Canadian institutions. It will be presented to the inquiry.

### News From China

### Killed In Spain

Since the Civil War in Spain began a little more than a year ago, nearly 400 British subjects, volunteer fighters on either side of the combat, have been killed. Detachments of the "White Guard" and the "Red Guard" have also been annihilated by Chinese troops.
