Water Scarcity

MOOSE JAW.—This southern Saskatchewan city is facing a shortage of water, and unless there is heavy rainfall a rationing system will be enforced. Daily supply makes it impossible to fill water mains.

Alberta Aids Irrigation

EDMONTON.—Construction of irrigation dams and establishment of community pastures in the drought area of Southern Alberta under the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act, has been requested by the Alberta Government. The proposed projects involving expenditure of more than \$200,000 are before Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Federal Minister of Agriculture, for his approval.

Arctic Patrol Returns

ABOARD S.S. VASCOPIE, Davis Strait.—The Federal Government's Eastern Arctic Patrol was steaming south this week, just inside the Arctic Circle on Davis Strait, while thousands of waterfowl streaked south through the skies, indicating approach of winter.

New Mental Hospital

HAMILTON.—Construction of an entirely new mental hospital on the Mountain, estimated to cost \$3,000,000, is being considered by Hon. T. D. McQuesten, Minister of Highway and Public Works. It was revealed this week.

Franc Drops Again

PARIS.—A fresh plunge of the franc to its lowest level in nearly a decade raised the acute political question of exchange control, which has been Public Works, it was revealed this week.

Macdonald Threats Withdrawal

LONDON.—Fascist Italy, supported by Nazi Germany, has indicated she might renounce her Spanish neutrality pledges in the event of an Italian invasion of North Africa and in the Mediterranean area.

Great Japanese Offensive

PEIPING.—Japanese headquarters announced the greatest offensive undertaken by the Japanese Army since the Russo-Japanese war thirty-two years ago, driving the Chinese back on a broad front south and southeast to Peiping.

Search Cellar For Body

ONTARIO Provincial Police dug in the cellar of a home on Vaughan Rd., Toronto in hopes of finding the body of Mrs. Christina MacKenzie of Allandale, missing wife of George Rodger, arch-burglar serving a term of nine years for burglary and robbery. The floor was broken up but no trace was found of the Rodger bride. The scene of the police search was the last place the woman was seen alive. She disappeared two days after she and Rodger moved into the Vaughan Road house.

Italy Branded

GENOVA.—The troubled paths of China and Spain crossed at Genoa this weekend at a League of Nations Council session which heard Spanish Premier Juan Negrin brand Italy as the "intruder" whose submarines have attacked Mediterranean shipping.

Lindebergh British Subject?

NEW YORK.—A professional source associated with Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh said this week the famous aviator intended to renounce his United States citizenship and become a British subject. The informant declined to be quoted, or to permit use of his name, but his connection with Lindbergh was an established one. The manner in which the information was obtained was not divulged, and confirmation or denial could not be obtained elsewhere.

Premier Declares World Civilization is at Stake

Canada Joins With Seven Other Nations in a Pledge for World Economic Cooperation—International Peace Broadcast Heard

Prime Minister Mackenzie King Sunday night stated that in this stormy and transitional period of human affairs, his country is pledged to cooperate with the United States and other nations in the reduction of customs duties on a most-favorable basis. "Such an agreement would surely be to our benefit as well as that of the world," he said.

It was plain, therefore, he said, that "governments and individuals alike must pursue the arts of co-operation and conciliation in every possible field of affairs."

The Canadian Prime Minister, joined with leaders of many nations in an international symposium on world economic cooperation sponsored by the National Peace Conference. They pledged themselves to strive for peace through economic cooperation.

"Eight Nations," King said, on a broadcast with Cordell Hull, United States Secretary of State; Anthony Eden, the British Foreign Secretary; and other world leaders, "is a good start towards the world-wide peace which is the goal of the League of Nations."

"I am glad to see that all countries are realizing that the best way to make sure that this is not only a world-wide peace but a world-wide economic cooperation," he added.

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U. S. Wants Arms Curb
WASHINGTON.—Secretary of State Cordell Hull has conveyed to foreign governments his hope that the United States can share leadership of a movement to halt the world armament race "when and if" an agreement appears possible.

This was discovered by the publication of instructions sent recently to all diplomatic and consular agents in a new effort by Hull to promote world peace through international economic rehabilitation.

LONDON.—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain returned to London Saturday from his vacation in Scotland, but is expected to remain in Scotland for some time.

Plague Gaining Virulence
SHANGHAI.—A cholera epidemic reaching grave proportions spread through the foreign sectors of the metropolis this week-end, striking down more than 100 additional victims over the weekend.

£10,000,000 Borrowed
OTTAWA.—Nearly \$10,000,000 has been lent under the Home Improvement plan since it was instituted last November. The total on Sept. 15, Finance Minister Dunning said this week, was \$9,294,000, an increase of \$954,000 over August 23.

Britain Defers Action
LONDON.—Great Britain will take no action in connection with the wounding in China of her ambassador, Sir Hume Knatchbull-Hugessen, by Japanese bullets until the Government receives a reply to its protest from Italian newspapers.

British Steamers Bombed
VALENCIA.—Two British steamers, the Jean Wreans and the Praet, were damaged and the captain of one was injured by shrapnel during an airmail air raid on the Port of Valencia this week-end.

Naval Ring Breaks Up
LONDON.—The naval ring round Spain is ended. Great Britain and France, acting in concert, have notified members of the Spanish non-intervention committee that their warships engaged in patrolling the Spanish coast would be withdrawn.

Barrie Leaves \$867,300
LONDON.—The will of Sir James Matthew Barrie, playwright, was granted this week, showing a gross estate of \$867,300. Among his bequests was \$100,000 to his beloved Elizabeth Cairnes.

Bobbies Join in Embarrassing Chase
LONDON.—A large bear fell from a lorry passing over Blackfriars Bridge in London, recently, the driver continued, not noticing he had lost the animal. The bear squealed in every direction until a policeman came to his aid. Six men joined in the hilarious chase and the "bobbies" had a hard time before they finally cornered it.

Patrol Interrupted
GENOVA.—A patrol of British and Italian troops was interrupted by the attack on the Italian liner Anzani, which was sunk by a German submarine.

Convicted of Murder
OTTAWA.—A man convicted of murder in Ontario was sentenced to life imprisonment in the provincial penitentiary.

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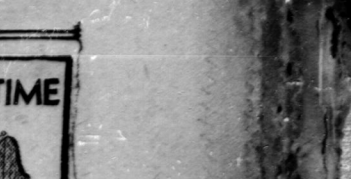
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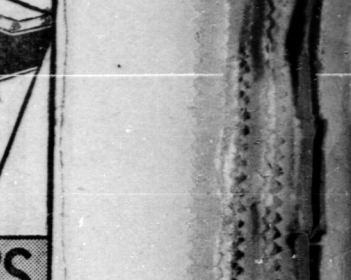
